The Aggies Won: Trinity Downed by 14-0 Score

The Aggies have done it! For the first time in nine starts the Cadet gridders came out on the top end of the score against a fired-up group of Trinity Tigers Saturday night by a score of 14-0.

During the first half of the contest played in San Antonio, it looked as if the Tigers might have enough punch to out-man the favored Cadets as they doubled their rushing yardage and made eight first downs compared to the Ags' five.

The second half was a different story as A&M took the opening kickoff and drove 74 yards in 13 plays for the first counter. Big Sam Byer was used as the "pile driver" for the last few yards to paydirt as he carried for seven, two and one yards. For the first time this season Daryle Keeling got his chance at the uprights and put the ball squarely through the middle.

After the Aggies kicked off to Trinity, it was the Tigers' last chance for the ball in the third quarter. Thanks to some fine rushes on the Trinity quarterback by the Ags, the Tigers only managed to run eight plays.

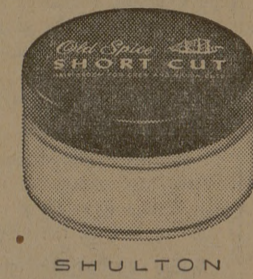
Eddie Van Dyke and Jack Estes took over the ground-gaining duties at this stage of the game and chalked up yardage to the Trinity 12, which was mainly due to a 43-yard scamper by Estes. However, the drive was halted by Trinity's 240-pound plus line on the two-yard line.

Van Dyke led the next Aggie drive that put them on the Trinity four with about two and a half minutes left. Babe Craig's number was called and he dived across the goal for six more points. Again Keeling split the uprights. Trinity threatened in the closing minute after completing a 48-yard desperation pass to the Cadet three. The next play would have been a touchdown if the Tigers' John Fulton hadn't fumbled in the end zone where a host of Cadets pounced on the ball for a touch-back.

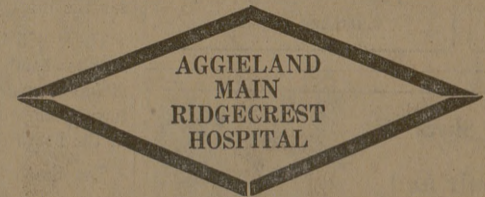

Crockett Capitalizes on CHS Mistakes for 14-0 Victory

The Crockett Bulldogs took advantage of two third period breaks to take a 14-0 non-district win from the luckless A&M Consolidated Tigers in Crockett Friday night.

The win was the fourth for the District 22-AA favorites, with only a 12-12 tie with Gladewater marring their record. The loss dropped the Bengals deeper into the District 19-AA cellar in non-district action, as they absorbed their fourth loss in five outings. Their lone win came at the expense of the Bulldogs' district mate, Madisonville, 16-14.

Both clubs threatened twice in the first two quarters, as the Tigers moved inside the Bulldog 20 on two occasions, after Larry Randolph had recovered a 'Dog fumble and Bob Adams had blocked Horace Moore's punt. Both times fumbles halted the Bengals short of the promised land.

The winners also took advantage of two breaks for deep penetrations, one to the five-yard line as the end of the half approached. Quarterback Dave Ferguson tossed a TD pass, but the officials ruled it no good because the ball hadn't been snapped when the horn sounded for the half.

Crockett got the first break in the second half and went on to tally their two touchdowns for the victory. Ozzie Burke fumbled Moore's punt in the Tiger 12 with James Birdwell capturing the ball for Crockett. Tailback Ken Bowman took it in, the last of three plays being a 10-yard end sweep with 3:45 remaining. Johnny Frye's kick was blocked.

The Bulldogs lengthened their lead to 8-0 with a safety later in the period when Jimbo Carroll received a bad pass from center on a fourth down punt situation, falling on the ball for a safety in the end zone.

The free kick following the

safety was returned by Ferguson to the Tiger 30 as the third period ended. The Bulldogs marched to the five, setting up a first and goal situation. Three plays netted four yards and on the crucial fourth down try, Ferguson found Moore in the end zone for the one-yard strike. Frye's kick was again blocked.

The Tigers put on another threat as Carroll recovered another 'Dog fumble on the Tiger 35. Quarterback Russell Welch found Randolph in the open and hit him with a 47-yard toss to the Bulldog 18. Four plays only netted eight yards and the Tigers had to settle for the 14-0 whitewashing.

SWC Stats Take Weekend Shakeup

There were some shakeups in Southwest Conference football statistical leaders last week and the most notable came in the progress of Billy Cox, Rice quarterback, and Mike Cotten, field general of the Texas Longhorns.

Dick Polson of Texas Tech was held to seven yards rushing by Texas but retained his lead. However, teammate Glen Amerson, who was leading the passers, lost his perch to Cox.

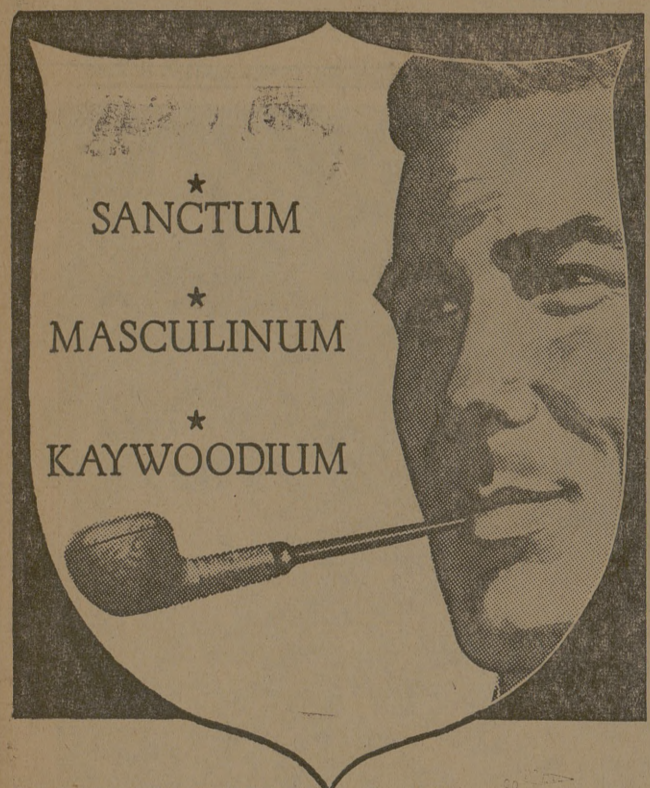
The Rice quarterback threw for 98 yards against Tulane and moved into first place with 14 completions out of 27 for 180 yards. Amerson is second with 13 of 25 for 173 yards.

Cotten passed for 12 yards against Texas Tech, his throws

including two 55-yard touchdown shots, and it put the Longhorn star into first place in total offense. Cotten has gained 251 yards on 36 plays. He replaced George McKinney of Arkansas who has 242 yards on 47 plays.

Polson leads in ball-carrying with 155 yards on 17 runs but is pursued closely by Sam Byer of A&M, who pushed into second place with 29 yards against Trinity. Byer has 139 yards in 38 carries.

Roland Jackson of Rice leads the punters with a 45.2 yards average on five kicks and Randy Sims of A&M, who was injured before the Trinity game, is the leading punt returner with 105 yards on five runs for a 21.0 average.
