

Cadets Swamp UOP; SMU Comes Here Saturday

A&M gave the nation's 10th ranked defensive team a lesson in greed Tuesday as the Cadets swamped the University of the Pacific, 86-39.

Before the encounter, the UOP had allowed their opponents but 52.7 points per game. Moreover, the Tigers contributed to their own downfall, hitting but 25 per cent from the floor while the Farmers racked up a 54 per cent mark.

Carroll Broussard continued his machine-like point making with a 24 point output, upping his game average to 22.9 over the season. Don and Pat Stanley followed with 19 and 15 points respectively. But the big factor in the game for Don Stanley was holding Ken Stanley — no relation — to 13 points. Ken Stanley was ranked 7th in the nation in scoring prior to the A&M game.

The Ags commanded a 39-26 lead at the half and quickly expanded

it to a 30-point edge at 56-26. A&M now meets Southern Methodist University in a Southwest Conference match in White Coliseum Saturday. Going into the game A&M holds a 9-6 season record and a 3-2 loop mark, good for a tie for third place.

The Ags widened the margin to 34 points with 6:15 remaining when Lewis Qualls crammed one through the net. Gary Brink tallied the Tigers' last goal and Qualls again pulled the Ags up to their 34-point margin with a 20-foot hook shot.

The clock gleamed 4:37. Carroll Broussard, A&M's methodical scorer, was taken from the game with but 15 points to his credit. But a minute later Coach Rogers returned the 6-5 junior to the floor and Broussard responded with a quick nine-point output to up his total to 24.

Don Stanley led the Ags in rebounds, collecting 12 of the 50 grabbed by the Cadets, while the Tigers could manage but 34 rebounds for the evening.

Prairie View replaced Hofstra in second place with the Hempstead, N.Y., team falling to fourth behind Mississippi Southern, which has won 15 of its 16 games. Southern Illinois 14-3 is fifth.
