The Owls from Houston come to town tonight, probably feeling quite a bit wiser after their upset

win over the Texas Longhorns Saturday night, but A&M is also in high spirits after dousing Southern Methodist's championship hopes considerably.

Besides being fresh from the TU victory, Rice has been shining in spurts all season. They were "half-time" winners in Dallas last week as they led SMU 28-24 in the first stanza.

Rice's two big men, Olle Shipley and Mike Maroney who stand 6-6 and 6-7 respectively, have proven dangerous with their rebounding for the past few games. In Saturday's encounter Shipley netted 14 points and Maroney had 12 points.

Also Roger McQueary got into the Rice double figures Saturday night with 14 points.

For the Cadets, Carroll Broussard is still top scorer for the season and in conference play. In conference Broussard is almost 10 points of his closest contender, Del Ray Mounts of Texas Tech.

However, Doc Hayes and crew seemed to have Broussard's "num-

ber" Saturday as he was limited to 17 points.

A&M came through to show they had plenty of other talent on the floor besides Broussard as all five starters hit in the double figures and the second half defensive play was sparked by Wayne Annett who continually swiped the ball from the long-legged Ponies. At one time during the contest, SMU's Steve Strange looked as if someone had just cut off his arm as

Annett rushed in to grab the ball when Strange was starting a hook shot from the corner. Annett action was comparable to a halfback taking the ball from the quarterback in footballs familiar statue of liberty play.

Big Lewis Qualls showed more hustle and speed than he has shown all season and thrilled Aggie fans with one of his whishing hooks that helped to net his eight points for the night.




Frosh Tame Apaches: Try Owlets New

The Aggie Fish continued their winning ways last Saturday night in White Coliseum as they whizzed past the highly-touted Tyler Junior College Apaches, 76-61.

This marks the fifth win this season for the Fish with only one loss to the hands of the Baylor Cubs.

Jumping to an early lead, the Fish led the Apaches by 16 points, the largest lead of the night, with 12:31 left in the first half, 23-7. The Apaches finally found their range and managed to compile 31

points before halftime while the Fish had 43.

Bennie Lenox continued to be the bright spot of the Fish's attack as he dropped in 20 points although he had considerable help from Bill Robinette and Lynn Merritt with 15 each and Chuck McGuire with 13 points. The big man for the Apaches was 6-9 1/2 center, Pete Petrou, who hooped 20 points and shared top scoring honors with Lenox.

The Fish showed that they are improving in their weakest department, rebounding, as they out-

bounded the much taller Apaches, 70-57. Robinette and Lenox demonstrated their ability to compete with a big man (Petrou) as they collected 15 and 12 rebounds respectively to 11 of Petrou.

During the second half, the closest the Apaches could come to overtaking the hard-charging Fish was eight points.

The Apaches guarded Lenox closely throughout the game and even more so during the second half, but the Fish showed that they were not a one man team as they

had four men scoring in the figures.

Tonight the Fish play the Rice Owlets who are having their best team in 16 years. Thus far this season the compiled a 4-2 record, in the Texas Yearlings last day night in Houston, 84-76.

Rice's main strength came from four boys from the northern states of Illinois, Indiana, Top man is Khine, 6-9 center, from Indiana. Game time is at 6 in the gym.
