

IVC Rejects Bid for Cage Division

 ST. LOUIS—The Missouri Valley Conference has rejected a proposed basketball division within it decided—for the present—to continue its current organization. Conference Commissioner Norve Neve said after the MVC meeting Wednesday the league's expansion committee "would continue to probe expansion possibilities and make an announcement in the near future from Valley headquarters in Kansas City." Neve claimed the meeting was harmonious but observers said an actual membership showdown between the football-minded and basketball-minded schools in the league was only postponed. Neve said the athletic directors would speculate on possible future league members.

about the meeting. St. Louis is a basketball power but doesn't play football.

Only Tulsa, North Texas State, Cincinnati and Wichita contested for the conference football title last fall. Drake and Bradley have football teams but do not try for the crown. Both, however, are basketball powers.

The conference has been shaken by recent withdrawal of three schools with good all-round programs—Oklahoma State, Detroit and Houston.

The basketball powers want a strong basketball conference. But some members have strong football teams and probably don't want to give up the sport and leave the Valley.

The proposal by basketball power for a basketball division in the league never came to a vote.

It was obvious that football schools, led by Tulsa's athletic director, Glen Dobbs, didn't budge in their stand that any new conference members must play football, as well as basketball. Dobbs had no comment on the eting.

U of H Accepts NCAA Basketball Tourney Invitation

 NEW YORK—The University of Houston Wednesday accepted an invitation to compete as an at-large representative in the Midwest regionals of the NCAA basketball championships.

Roy Spec Keene, Oregon State athletic director and chairman of the Western Selection Committee, announced the choice through the NCAA Service Bureau. The site and exact dates—March 13, 14 or 15—of the regionals will be announced later.

Houston is the fourth team to be selected for NCAA play. The others are St. Bonaventure, St. John's, in the East, and Louisville, in the Midwest.

Two Big Upsets Featured In Wednesday Nite Games

 COLUMBIA, S. C.—South Carolina surged from behind in the late stages Wednesday night to upset sixth ranked North Carolina 89-82 despite a 65-point shooting performance by the Tarheels' York Larese and Doug Moe.

A phenomenal South Carolina shooting average of 62 per cent from the floor and accuracy from the free throw line when the pressure was on keyed the upset. It was the Gamecocks' first Atlantic Coast Conference victory in nine tries this season.

The South Carolina scoring was a team affair, but it was all Larese and Moe for the Tarheels. Larese scored 36 points and Moe 29 as the two kept the visitors in the game until the final moments. Larese fouled out with a minute to go.

The game was close most of the way. South Carolina pulled ahead 82-80 with a minute and a half left. Then the Gamecocks sewed

it up with free throws in the final seconds.

 RICHMOND, Ky.—Eastern Kentucky upset Louisville's NCAA-bound Cardinals 80-74 in basketball Wednesday night, gaining revenge for an earlier defeat.

The Maroons handed 10th-ranked Louisville its fourth defeat against 17 victories this season. One of the Cards' triumphs was a 70-69 squeaker over Eastern.

Despite a 32-point performance by Louisville's John Turner, the Cards couldn't cope with a late Eastern surge led by Carl Cole.

Cole, who hit only two field goals in the first half, ended with nine points, five scored in the final two minutes.

Louisville started strongly against the determined Maroon squad and managed to nurse a 40-38 margin at intermission.

After nibbling at the lead, Eastern edged ahead. A field goal by Turner made it 78-70 pushed Eastern out of reach of Louisville.

Gary Cavasas, a 190-pound halfback from Jesse Jones High School in Houston. He has run the 100-yard dash in 9.9.

Fred Moss, a 205-pound guard from San Antonio Highlands. Myers said Moss is considered one of the outstanding linemen in the San Antonio area.

Ken Smith, 195-pound guard from Magnolia. He was an all-district selection for the regional Class B championship Magnolia teams the past two seasons.
