By the adoption of the pre-enrollment application, per an agreement with the University of Texas Interscholastic League, high school athletes are privileged to commit as early as Feb. 1 this year. Prior to this year the youngsters could not sign with any Southwest Conference school until March 15.

"We believe the conference institutions and the high schools will be mutually pleased with this response to the pre-enrollment application," said Howard Grubbs, executive secretary of the conference. "The number of commitments for the first two weeks of the 1961 recruiting period more than doubles that of a corresponding period a year ago."

Eighty-six prospects were signed by the eight Southwest Conference schools during the first two weeks of recruiting, starting Feb. 1. A year ago the same institutions signed only 38 zoys during the comparable span of time.
