

'It's All Over Now'

It's all over now for A&M's basketball team, but they bowed out in style as they whipped the Arkansas Razorbacks, 70-68 with four seconds left on the clock in Fayetteville.

There were heroes all over the place last night and even though Carroll Broussard dropped in the winning counters with a long jump shot, the Stanley Twins turned in their best combined performance of the whole season as they dropped in 39 points between them. Don had 21, Pat netted 18 while Broussard's total was 19.

Arkansas had two men close to the Aggies' scoring mark as Jerry Carlton and Pat Foster tossed in 18 points each.

The nip and tuck game was tied 15 times and the lead changed four

times in the last three and one half minutes with Foster tying the score at 68-68 on a free throw with 1:21 left. Just a few minutes earlier Foster stole the ball from A&M and dropped in a bucket to put Arkansas back in the game with a 60-59 score, after the Cadets had gained a six point margin earlier in the second half. Foster could have been tabbed the Razorback's clutch player for the night as he scored 16 of his 18 points in the second half as well as his top defensive play.

As the game was nearing an end, A&M called time out with 12 seconds left. This was when Broussard got the ball at the circle, turned and fired with a dead hit. Arkansas called time out and the Hogs' Jerry Rogers got off a desperation shot that missed the basket four feet.

Texas Press Boxes Have Progressed

The Texas Sports Writers Association criticized the Wichita Falls press box and two months later it burned down. Of course, it wasn't the hot resolution that caused it but it did bring to mind the progress that has been made in press facilities in the last 30 years.

The Wichita Falls press setup would have been a paragon back in the twenties.

It wasn't until schoolboy football started to grow into the highly spectacle that it is today that thought was given to providing a suitable place for the knights of the typewriter to work.

The writers once walked up and down the sidelines, or got out onto the field in some instances, in reporting the games. Those were the days when the players had no numbers and you had to credit the runner according to his position. The left halfback invariably would run around right end, the right halfback around left end, the fullback into the line and of course the quarterback was always just back of center barking his signals, so there was little doubt about who was playing and making the plays.

When it rained there might be some difficulty because it was tough to even see the game much less figure out who was carrying the ball. But there were few substitutes and the system of figuring out who was doing what by the direction he ran held up pretty good.

There came a revolution when sports writers put a table and chair on the sidelines and reported the games from there. Jinx Tucker, the colorful sports editor of the Waco News-Tribune, was among the first to use this plan.

Once Tucker was reporting a game at Granger. An inebriated

fan had crawled under the table. Finally he emerged, and waving to the fans standing in front of the table snarled: "Get down, you guys, so reporters like me and Jinx Tucker can see what's going on."

Came the real revolution when press boxes were installed. They were usually very small and the writers had little opportunity to use them what with the Dads Club Junior Chamber of Commerce, Quarterback Club or local luncheon club crowding into the choice seats. There were numerous instances of the sports writers having to step outside in the stands to report the games.

The press box at Temple was on top of the grandstand, with no shade or roof. The wind would blow the paper out of the typewriter.

But the sports writers kept working at it, making derisive remarks about the conduct of the press boxes as for instance the time Dick Freeman of the Houston Chronicle said the Texas A&M press box was so small the other writers were forever putting things into his pocket. And then there was the crack about the Texas Western press box being the only one in the world with "wall to wall typewriters."

Every year there is improvement. Today you'll find most of the high schools provide quite adequate facilities. The colleges have sumptuous quarters for the press, even provide meals, turn out reports of the game in mimeograph form and make it a most enjoyable occasion for the boys of the typewriter to do their work. Getting tied up in traffic and reaching the stadium at the half is no handicap. The writer can just gather up the play-by-play reports and statistics and catch up with the game in five minutes.
