

Schedule Announced For Legal Seminar In Dallas

Seminars on labor laws, personal injury litigation and juvenile delinquency will be conducted by the Southwestern Legal Foundation in Dallas during November, according to College Station Attorney Philip B. Goode.

Goode, foundation resident representative, revealed the following schedule: Nov. 16-18, personal injury litigation institute, and Nov. 27-29, juvenile delinquency.

Among lectures at the labor law program will be several government officials. They include, Dr. Seymour Wolfbein, deputy assistant secretary of labor; Hobart Taylor, Jr., special counsel, President's committee on equal employment opportunity, and Frank W. McCulloch, chairman, National Labor Relations Board.

Doctors and lawyers from six states will serve as speakers at the personal injury conference. They will come from Alabama, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey, New York and Texas.

David L. Hackett of Washington, D. C., executive director of the President's committee on juvenile delinquency and youth crime, will be among those to address the

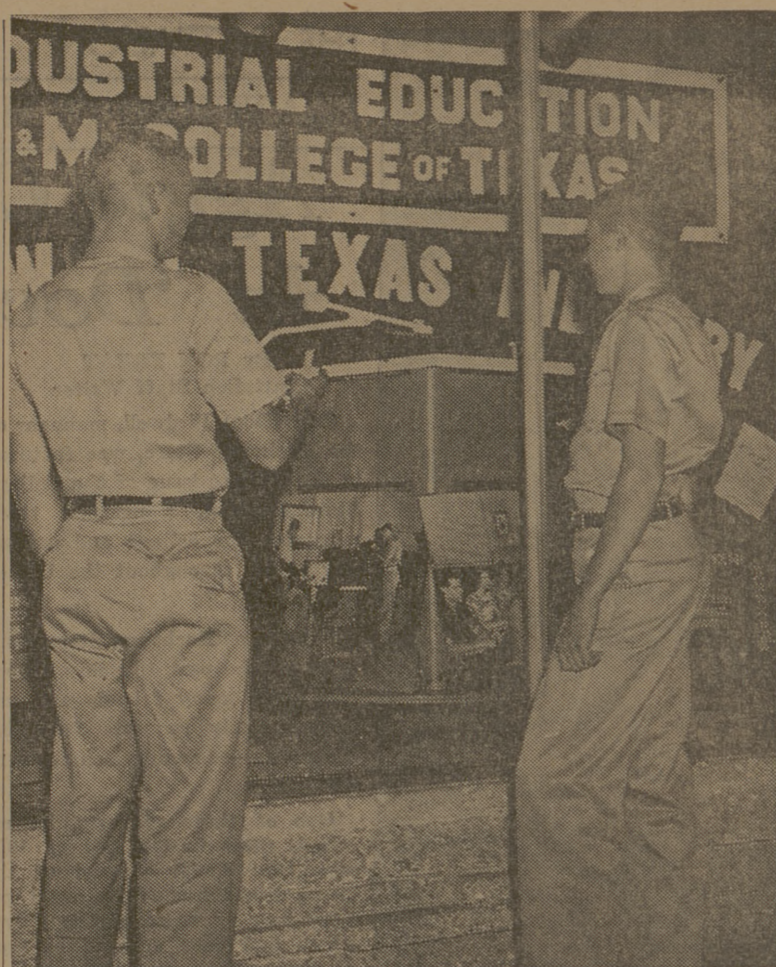
juvenile delinquency seminar. Copies of the programs may be obtained from the Southwestern Legal Foundation, 3315 Daniels, Dallas.

Hall Serving On Louisiana Cotton Panel

Dr. Wayne Hall, dean of graduate studies and professor of plant physiology and pathology, is participating as a consultant on a cotton research panel through tomorrow at the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, Baton Rouge.

The scientist was invited to the session by the Division of Experiment Stations of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Hall and other agricultural scientists will review cotton research at the Louisiana station and draft recommendations on how to improve the program. Discussions will involve both production and economics in cotton research.

Industrial Arts Degree Options Now Offered

Four options for an industrial arts teaching degree are being offered by the Department of Industrial Education. They are industrial arts-vocational teaching, industrial-distribution, industrial technology and industrial journalism.

The Department of Industrial Education offers programs at the baccalaureate, master, and doctorate levels. Graduate degrees are the master of science in industry education, the master of industrial education with a major in industrial education and the doctorate of education in industrial education. The department offers one of only four programs of industrial distribution in the United States. Industrial distribution involves all service functions concerned with the movement of industrial products. It is the business of supplying goods to industries in the area and offers careers in buying, warehousing, selling, engineering, shipping, advertising, financing, accounting and management.

Industrial arts teachers are prepared in several industrial areas such as electricity and electronics, machine processes, pattern making, founding, carpentry and cabinet making, ceramics, leathercraft, book-binding, sheet metal, art metal, lapidary and materials technology. In addition, students receive preparation in methods of teaching and preparation of instructional materials.

A&M is one of only two institutions in the state authorized to provide vocational-industrial teacher training. Under provisions of the Texas education agency qualified persons may become accredited vocational-industrial teachers certified to teach in approved vocational-industrial programs. Persons with at least three years experience in an approved trade or other vocation may qualify.

The vocational-industrial teacher option in the Department of Industrial Education provides a means for persons to obtain academic credit for job experience and under a planned program obtain a college degree at the same time.
