

Faculty Panel To Discuss Employment

A panel discussion on employment benefits for A&M faculty staff will be held tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. in the Assembly Room of the Memorial Student Center.

Louis H. Stern, assistant professor of economics, said yesterday members of the American Association of University Professors and the Texas Association of College Teachers will meet in joint session for the discussion.

A&M Comptroller W. C. Freeman will be moderator of the session. Gene Marsh of Houston will discuss group life insurance; L. L. Durst of Houston, group hospitalization; J. W. Hill, director of personnel insurance and safety for the college, state retirement systems; and Archie M. Kahan, director of the A&M Research Foundation, patents and patent law.

Stern said Freeman would discuss the new federal law on anti-trust.

A question-and-answer period on staff benefit in the A&M College system will be held after the panel discussion.

A&M Hosts Meeting of CEEB Colleges

A&M students may soon be able to take College Entrance Examination Board tests instead of some of the placement tests now being used, according to S. A. Kerley, head of the Counseling and Testing Center.

The use of CEEB tests will be discussed next Tuesday at the annual meeting of Texas colleges to use these examinations.

Dean of Instruction William Huff, Dean Frank W. R. Hubert of the School of Arts and Sciences, Kerley and Dr. Lannes Hope of the Counseling and Testing Center will attend the meeting at the University of Texas.

Discussions on the use of achievement tests and advanced placement examinations, current needs and expectations of the CEEB program and current issues and problems will be held. Common research in testing will be presented at the meeting.

Each year a Texas college which uses the CEEB tests is host for the annual meeting.

The first joint dinner-seminar of the Department of Economics and the Economics Club for the current academic year will be held this evening, Claude A. Bitner, assistant professor of economics and chairman of the seminar, announced Tuesday.

The dinner will be held in the Memorial Student Center cafeteria at 6:30 p.m. followed by the seminar in room 3D at 7:30. Members of the Department of Economics staff and graduate and undergraduate majors in economics are to attend.

Dr. C. H. Brown of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology will present a paper on "Factors Associated with the Migrant Status of Rural Youth."

Students At Consolidated Complete Two Examinations

Comprehensive testing took a large portion of time for students of A&M Consolidated High School last week.

Mrs. W. M. Dowell, counselor of schools, said students took School and College Ability Tests (SCAT) and Kuder Vocational and Personal Preference Record Tests.

SCAT was designed by the American Council on Educational Psychology to give an indication of a student's potential ability at higher grade levels.

It is comprised of four examinations, two covering verbal comprehension and two covering quantitative comprehension.

The Kuder Vocational and Personal Preference Record Tests are comprised of a series of examinations that give a general indication of the type of vocation in which the student seems most likely to succeed.

Mrs. Dowell said results of the tests will help the student in self-evaluation of his potential abilities and interests.

However, she noted the tests do not reflect memorized facts, but rely solely on the student's natural potential, thus giving a truer indication of his abilities.

The graded examinations will become a part of the student's record and should the student decide to attend college, the evaluations would be forwarded to counselors at the school for use in counseling and guidance of the new freshman.

A&M Hosts Joint District English Committee Meeting

Under the auspices of the Texas Joint English Committee for Schools and Colleges, A&M will host the District 1 Workshop beginning Saturday at 8 a.m. in the Memorial Student Center.

Approximately 125 junior and senior high schools and five colleges from the 25 counties in this district will be represented. The expected attendance is 250-300 people.

Keynote speaker for the workshop will be Martin Day of the University of Houston. Other speakers are Mrs. Ruby Ratliff of

Bellaire High School, Houston, who will explain her way of using outside reading, and Hugh Luke of A&M, who will show how he teaches poetry.

"The purpose of the conference," said Dr. Fred E. Ekfelt, general chairman of the conference, "is to bring teachers together to discuss English problems. This year we have chosen as our theme, 'Literature as a Key to the Understanding of Life.'"

The Texas Joint English Con-

ference had its beginning in 1950 when Thomas Mayo, head of the A&M Department of English at that time, organized the state into 12 districts and called the first general meeting on this campus.

Since the organization of the conference, District 1, roughly bounded by Galveston, Orange, Jasper and Bryan, has alternated its meetings between its high schools and colleges. Next year's conference will be held at Waltrip High School in Houston.

Borden Award Is Presented R. J. Hidalgo

Richard J. Hidalgo, '62, veterinary medicine student from Opelousas, La., has received the Borden Award for outstanding academic achievement.

Dr. A. A. Price, dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine, presented the award yesterday during the A&M chapter meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

Hidalgo completed his pre-professional courses at Louisiana State University before coming to A&M.

The Borden Award recognizes students in the fourth year of the professional curriculum in veterinary medicine who have the highest academic average for the first three years. Hidalgo has a grade point ratio of 2.67.

The Louisianian has earned a Distinguished Student rating each semester and has been elected to Phi Zeta and Phi Kappa Phi honorary scholastic fraternities.
