Crews stopped hauling logs out of the cutting area at 1:50 p.m. yesterday, and work was concentrated on clearing the loading area by nightfall. And that deadline was met, too. All logs were in the stacking area and all that was left at dark yesterday was stacking.

Fueling is scheduled to start at 4:30 p.m. tomorrow, with the lighting to be at 8 p.m.

"We are definitely going to double stack, and perhaps triple stack before it is finished." Head Yell Leader Jim Davis


