

# Texas Lutheran President To Speak Here On Feb. 7

Dr. Marcus Rieke, president of Texas Lutheran College, Seguin, will speak Feb. 7 at the All Faiths Chapel.

Rieke's topic, to be delivered at 7:30 p.m., is "The Relevance of

Faith in the Changing World." Rieke attended Spokana Junior College; graduated from St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn., with a B.A. degree; and from Capital University Theological Seminary,

Columbus, Ohio, with a B.D. degree.

He is a member of the American Lutheran Church with headquarters in Columbus. He was assistant pastor to Dr. Paul F. Hein, Grace Lutheran Church, San Antonio, in 1934-35, and served as pastor of St. John Lutheran Church, Genesee, Idaho, from 1935-1941.

In 1942 Rieke became youth director of the American Lutheran Church, serving approximately 65,000 young people in a program of worship, work, education and play.

For 10 years he has been a member of the Lutheran World Federation Committee on Stewardship and Congregational Life. He was a delegate of the American Lutheran Church to Lutheran World Federation meetings in Lund, Sweden, in 1947, in Hanover, Germany, in 1952, and in Minneapolis, Minn., in 1957.

# Formby Enters Texas' Race For Governor

McALLEN, Tex. (AP)—Former State Highway Commission chairman Marshall Formby of Plainview formally entered the race for Texas governor Wednesday. He pegged his announcement to concern for people and the state's vast economic potential.

Formby, who is 50, announced as a conservative Democrat at a luncheon in his honor given by lower Rio Grande Valley friends and boosters of the Valley's U.S. 83 expressway now under construction.

"All of Texas' sons and daughters then shall live a good life in dignity and freedom," he said. The assembled group paid tribute to Formby and said the luncheon was given in appreciation of his efforts while highway commission chairman in expediting the construction of the expressway. County commissioners of Hidalgo and Cameron counties passed resolutions last year to name the highway the "Marshall Formby Expressway" in his honor.

# Tomorrow Named State's Arbor Day

Arbor Day this year will be observed throughout Texas tomorrow, according to the official proclamation issued by Gov. Price Daniel. Marvin G. Angle, president, Texas Forestry Association, and Dr. At D. Folweiler, director, Texas Forest Service, witnessed the signing and accepted the official document.

The proclamation says, "Texas derives many benefits from its trees, as a raw material for its many industries, as protection for its soil, and as cover for wildlife.

"The continued economic progress of the state is, in a large measure, related to this forest wealth. Trees are not only living objects of beauty and utility, they are a renewable resource.

"To aid in the perpetuation of this gift of nature, our forests need to be protected from the ravages of forest fires, insects and disease, and renewed through annual planting."

In his proclamation, Gov. Daniel urges all Texans, particularly the public schools, to observe this occasion appropriately in the interest of our state and nation.

Arbor Day in Texas was first recognized in Temple, a community which originally had comparatively few trees. In 1889, the peo-

ple of Temple passed a resolution advocating the observance of Arbor Day on February 22. Senator Tyler, of Belton, introduced to the legislature an Arbor Day resolution which subsequently became a law.

This original Arbor Day law expired in 1925, and during the succeeding 24 years, the custom of observing Arbor Day on George Washington's birthday was continued by the governor's proclamation. In 1949, a resolution designating the third Friday in January as Arbor Day was adopted by the Texas legislature.
