Grant Awarded College System

A grant of \$62,850 has been made by the Rockefeller Foundation to the A&M System to support research on fundamental problems of nutrition in ruminant animals.

The research will be directed by Dr. William C. Ellis of the Department of Animal Husbandry. The grant covers a five-year period.

In commenting upon the research to be done under the grant, Ellis said a major objective would be a better understanding of the fundamental processes involved in forage digestion by ruminants — cattle and sheep, and how they are related to determining why certain forages are superior to others as a source of energy.

A&M Again Wins Designation As Military College

A&M has again been designated a military college for the 1961-62 school year.

J. P. Hannigan, dean of students, made the announcement today following notification by the United States Army and the United States Air Force.

"The Military College designation means the college will receive double the normal uniform allowance for each member of the Cadet Corps who resides in the military dormitories," Hannigan explained. "For those cadets who live off the campus or who do not live in a military dormitory, the single allowance is made."

Hannigan expressed his appreciation to the Military and Air Science staffs; to the commandant of cadets, tactical officers, and to the members of the corps for their leadership in winning the distinctive honor.

Col. Joe Davis, commandant, added his praise to the members of his staff and to the cadet commanders for their significant part in maintaining the military college classification.

Banished Russian To Speak Friday

Dr. Pithrim A. Sorokin of Harvard, University, who was banished from his native Russia in 1922 for his anti-Communist activities, will be a graduate lecture speaker here Friday.

The lecturer's talk, "Basic Trends of Our Times," will be heard at 8 p.m. in Room 231 of the Chemistry Building. The public is invited.

Dr. Wayne C. Hall, dean of graduate studies, said Dr. Sorokin is one of the world's outstanding sociologists. The speaker is chairman of the Harvard University Research Center in Creative Altruism, established as a result of his studies of how to make humans less selfish and more creative.

He has been at Harvard since 1930, the year he became a naturalized citizen, and he served until 1943 as chairman of the Sociology Department. He also taught six years at the University of Minnesota.

Dr. Sorokin came to the United States in 1923 after his banishment by the Soviet government for his anti-Communist activities. A staunch revolutionist and leader in the Russian Republic, he had been imprisoned by both the czarist and Communist regimes and sentenced to death before his final banishment.

He has been orphaned and self-supporting since the age of 10. Russian schools attended by the speaker include a teacher's college, a night school and the Psychological Institute. He has his Master's Degree in Criminal Law, and a Doctor of Sociology degree from the University of Saint Petersburg.

In America, he has published about 30 books, which have been translated into many languages. He also has written many scientific papers.

Dr. Sorokin is an honorary member of the International Institute of Sociology; a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the Royal Academy of Belgium, Royal Academy of Roumania and Czechoslovakia Agricultural Academy; and an honorary Doctor of the Mexican National University.

Nuclear Engineers To Hear Reactor Safety Designer

A specialist in reactor safety design for General Dynamics in Fort Worth will address a nuclear engineering seminar Friday.

Dr. Reuben E. Fields, consultant to the chief of nuclear design and operation at the Nuclear Aerospace Research Facility, will discuss "Experimental Evaluation of Nuclear Reactor Hazard Potentials."

Persons interested in nuclear engineering are invited to attend the lecture at 4 p.m. in Room 211 of the Petroleum Engineering Building, Dr. R. G. Cochran, nuclear engineering department head, said. Fields is concerned with the operational and experimental safety aspects of two three-megawatt research and a critical facility of General Dynamics. He has participated in the design and execution of several large scale field tests for the evaluation of reactors involving release and atmospheric transport of fission products. He holds a B.S. degree in electrical engineering from Georgia Institute of Technology, and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in physics from the University of Wisconsin.
