

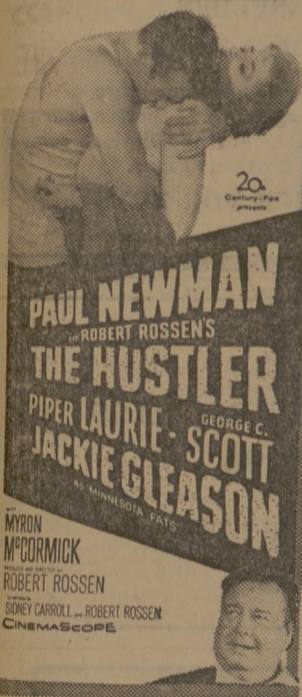
EXTRA-MUSICAL PRACTICE

RESEARCH STRESSED

Statistics Expert To Speak Friday

"Industrial Research in Statistics and Computing" will be the lecture subject of a soap company official who will be heard here Friday.

The speaker is Dr. Harry Smith Jr., head of the Department of Mathematics and Statistics for Procter and Gamble. He will make his talk at 2 p.m. in the faculty room of the Richard Coke Building.

Dr. Wayne C. Hall, dean of graduate studies said heads of departments, deans, directors and grad-

uate faculty are invited to hear the lecture.

As head of the Department of Mathematics and Statistics, Smith is responsible for technical training and technical competence of all statisticians in the company. The department consults with all phases of business and has several projects underway at this time. During the past few years, the speaker has delivered many addresses on mathematics and statistical topics throughout the United States. At present he is giving a course in experimental statistics to 22 members of management of the Research Division of Armco Steel Corporation.

Smith joined Procter and Gamble in 1955 as the company's first statistician. His first job was to determine the extent that statistics should play in the organization and to gradually evolve a plan for a statistical unit within the company.

The mathematician proposed that the statistical organization be split into two independent parts. The company accepted the plan, and Smith was made head of the Department of Mathematics and Statistics in the industrial engineering organization.

During the period 1957-59, the mathematical function of the company also became his responsibility. In 1959 the industrial engineering organization became a corporate function, and the Department of Mathematics and Statistics had its scope broadened to include all phases of the company's business.

Smith received his AB degree from the University of Delaware in 1943, and his MA in 1948 and his doctorate in 1954 from North Carolina State College. He was on a special assignment in 1946 to the University of Basel, Basel, Switzerland, and from 1949-50 he studied at University College in London.

His thesis title for the MA degree was "An Application of the Elliptical Distribution Function."
