Antoine Relieves Leipper Abord A&M Ship Hidalgo

Jack O. Hill, a member of the department of Oceanography and Meteorology research staff, and John W. Antoine, a department research scientist, were to meet Leipper's oceanography ship, The Hidalgo, at Corpus Christi yesterday.

Atlantic City No Fun Town When Seaboard Storm Hits

Beauty pageants, lazing in the sun and a good time is what most delegates look forward to in the famous convention center, Atlantic City, N.J.

Ed W. Kerlick, chief instructor of the Job Training and Safety program at the Engineering Extension Service, was more than disappointed when he arrived only to find a Yankee seaboard storm as his Texas tornado.

Kerlick's hard luck story had to begin when he arrived at the Boardwalk City over a week to attend the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's conference.

The weather was fine when he checked into his hotel facing the sea, but he awoke the next morning to find the boardwalk covered with ice and snow, a debris-filled

ocean whipped by an 80-m.p.h. wind and several building's ground floors flooded.

A three-day schedule had originally been set up for the delegates. But after six of the visitors suffered broken legs because of the high wind, and one died of a heart attack, the convention was called off.

Unfortunately, getting out of the storm did not turn out to be an easy thing to do. All planes were grounded with flooded runways, trains were not in service and highways were out.

The trip was not all bad luck, though. They are designed to be used by students of first aid training to practice mouth-to-mouth respiration.

Pamphlet On TMA Among Many Projects Underway

Several projects of the Texas Maritime Academy are now underway, according to Capt. B. M. Dodson, head of the new academy.

One of the most important is the completion of a pamphlet providing information on the maritime academy which is to be established at Galveston. These pamphlets will be ready for distribution next week, Dodson said.

Dodson said that most of the present maritime academies have a limited enrollment and that this

will be true also of the Texas academy for several years. He added, "Those who get in now will be fortunate young men."

Commenting on entrance requirements, Dodson said that these would be similar to the present ones of the college. The exceptions are that a student must be between the ages of 17 and 22 and must be unmarried and remain so while in school.

Plans are underway at Galveston to provide laboratories, boat shops, and machine shops for use by the students, said Dodson. Those majoring in marine engineering

Dodson added that students will be taught how to handle small boats under the control of oars, sails, or power. One of the purposes for this instruction is to make sailing a popular recreation among the students, he said.

Dodson also announced that he will go before the Curriculum Board Monday to get a final approval on the curriculum which has been set up.
