through the mixture of fats and glycerine and distillation under high temperatures, are emulsifying agents used primarily in bakery products to produce lightness of texture and to prolong freshness. The new process is chemical, requiring no distillation.

Adoption of a trimester plan to provide full use of the facilities the year around and speed up the graduation of veterinarians, was adopted for the School of Veterinary Medicine at A&M.

Under the plan, students of Veterinary medicine will attend school for three 15-week periods each year, with a four week summer vacation, instead of the present 9-months, two semester terms.

Graduation would require 2 years and 11 months, as compared with the present 3 years and 8½ months from the time of entering the veterinary program. The change-over will be made over a five-year period, phasing out the current classes by requiring attendance at summer sessions.

The first classes to go on the full

trimester schedule will enroll in 1964. By making full use of present facilities and gradually increasing the teaching staff, it is hoped that the School of Veterinary Medicine will be able to double its enrollment capacity within the next 10 years.

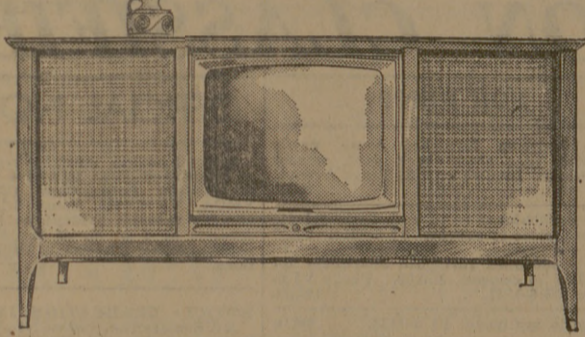
It is our hope that none of our clients will be required by an airline to pay any sum from \$5.00 to \$40.00 for not using a flight on which he has reservations and is ticketed.
