

Aggies Thrash Baylor, 12-

A&M's predominantly sophomore baseball team showed they meant business in the Southwest Conference baseball race as they soundly thrashed Baylor 12-6 behind the power hitting of Frank Stark, Bill Hancock, Dave Johnson and a Baylor gift of four errors.

The league-leading Farmers go into next week's crucial two-game series with Texas needing one victory to clinch the title as the race goes down to the wire.

Texas remained a thin one-half game behind the Ags by crushing TCU 7-3 in Fort Worth. Texas has a 10-2 record while A&M is 11-2.

Dave Johnson opened the scoring in the Aggies' conquest of Baylor by smashing a solo home run deep and high over the fence in straightaway center field as the lead-off batter in the second inning.

Stark duplicated Johnson's shot following a walk to Bill Grochett and a fielder's choice by Hancock

in the third inning. The Aggies added four more in the third on a walk to Robert McAdams, a double by Roger Crouch and Ray Hall's single.

This spelled the end for Bear starter Henry Perkins. He was replaced by Richard Couey who was greeted with a hard-hit ball by Bill Puckett that got past the Baylor first baseman. Couey then served up a double to Chuck McGuire before striking out second baseman Grochett to retire the side.

Baylor came back with four runs in the top of the fourth on three singles and a double by Audie Cox, Bear centerfielder, to remain in the game.

The Ags picked up breathing room in the fifth when singles by McAdams and Puckett and another Baylor error were good for two runs.

Doubles by Hancock and pinch-hitter John Burton coupled with the fourth Baylor error brought in three more runs in the sixth to wrap up the slippery-fingered Bears.

McGuire got the win giving him a 5-1 season record although he

needed help from junior pitcher Kenny Floyd who hurled the three innings. Perkins lost the loss for the Bears.

The 6-0, 12-6 losses to the Aggies eliminated the Bears from conference race. They are a 7-5 record.

Former Ag Baseball Great To Be Honored In Houston

Mayor Lewis Cutrer of Houston has proclaimed that May 7 be Wally Moon Day in the Bayou City. A former Aggie baseball star and now standout outfielder for the Los Angeles Dodgers, Moon will be in Houston through the first part of next week for the Dodgers' three-game series with the Colt 45's.

To highlight the occasion, the Houston A&M Club will honor

Moon at its weekly noon luncheon in the Rice Hotel Main Ballroom. Marvin Tate, president of the Houston club, said the luncheon will be an open affair but quickly added, "Sorry, ladies, but the meeting will be just like Texas A&M College—men only."

Further tribute will be paid to Moon at a pregame ceremony on May 8.

Marty Karow, now baseball coach at Ohio State University, discovered Moon in Hope, Ark., and recruited him for A&M where he was then baseball and basketball coach. Karow will fly down from Columbus, Ohio, to attend the luncheon and also to meet another of his former players, Frank Howard, who went into the Dodger system from Ohio State.

A&M Intercollegiate Rodeo 10-12. Sam Houston leads the region and can't be overlooked. The Ags and McNeese are running neck-and-neck for third in the first go-round. The first two teams in the region will go to the National Intercollegiate Rodeo in Colorado.
