

Summer Storage Facilities To Open

Summer storage facilities will be offered to students this year in the basement of Dormitory 3 and Ramp A of Walton Hall. Starting Monday, May 28, 4 to 5 p.m., and Tuesday, May 29 through Saturday, June 2, 11 to 12 a.m. and 4 to 5 p.m., items will be accepted for storage, according to Bennie A. Zinn, director of the Department of Student Affairs.

Zinn reminded students that storage is at the student's own risk, but that all efforts will be made to insure their safety.

All storage charges must be

paid at the time of storing. The Agronomy Society will handle the storing of items and all revenues will be placed in the society's treasury.

Students now living in college dormitories must remove all personal belongings by 6 p.m., Saturday, June 2. All dormitories not to be used for the summer sessions will be locked at that time, according to Harry L. Boyer, housing manager.

Those students who wish to secure their refund on key deposits must do so at the Housing Office in the YMCA Building before leaving school. A key deposit receipt and the key are required to secure the \$1 refund. Students attending summer school may swap keys and secure their refund at the end of the summer session.

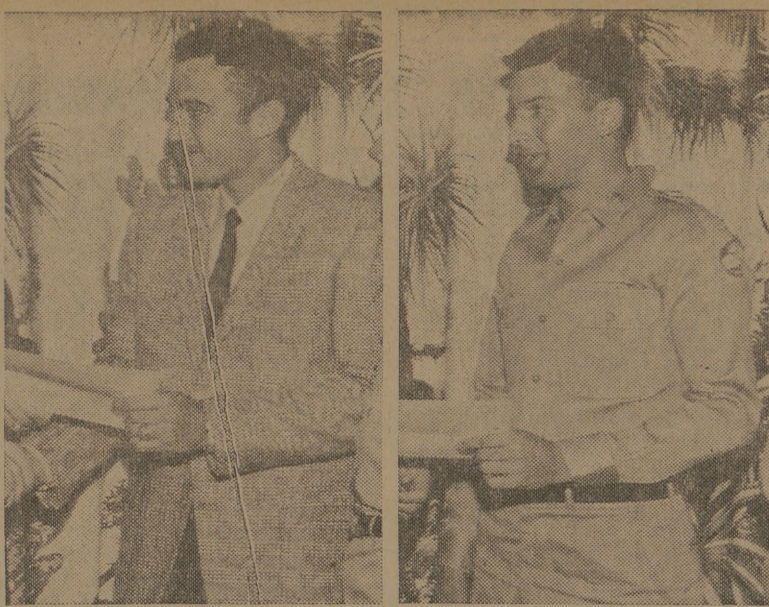

Franklin Jury Requests Files In Death Probe

FRANKLIN, Tex. (AP) — The Robertson County grand jury asked Wednesday for Department of Agriculture records in an effort to find a motive in a mysterious death linked to the Billie Sol Estes case.

The grand jury subpoenaed William Elliott, chief of the department's investigative division at Temple and records he holds concerning a probe into Estes' cotton allotments by department official Henry Marshall.

The grand jury was to hear a report Thursday from a medical examiner which examined the exposed body of Marshall, found to death in June with five wounds from a .22 caliber bolt action rifle.

The medical report is expected to help determine whether Marshall committed suicide, as a just-peace ruled, or was murdered, and whether he was shot in the back.

Dr. J. A. Jachimezyk of Houston, medical examiner, reaffirmed that he has not told anyone Marshall was shot in the back. He said "We are trying to determine where the wounds entered, and this will take time. There are five wounds, four on the front and one in the back. We are trying to determine among other things whether the wound in the back was an exit wound or an entry wound but so far we definitely do not know."

Dr. Jachimezyk who today said that it was his "tentative personal opinion that Marshall's death was not a suicide." District Attorney Bryan Russ later reported that the autopsy indicated Marshall was shot in the back.

Justice Judge John Barron, one of those who did not agree with the original verdict of suicide, and ordered the grand jury investigation, said that if the grand jury rules the case a homicide, "There are a group of people the grand jury will want to talk to, either to rule them in or rule them out."

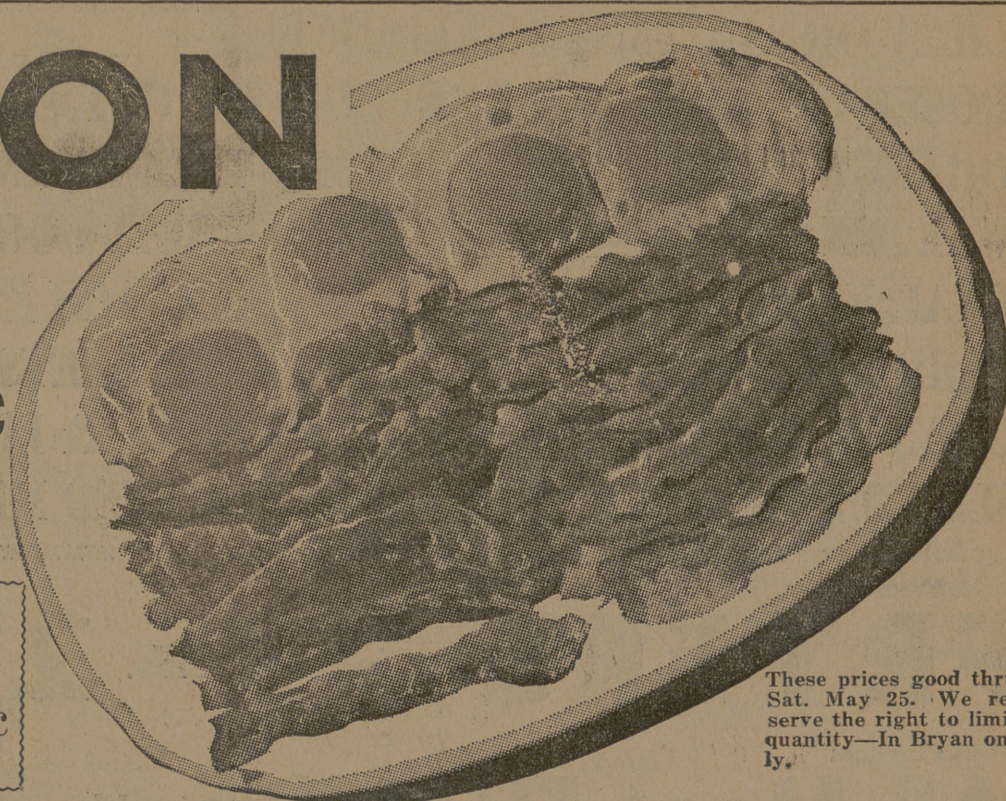
