

4-H Clubbers Due Here June 5 For Statewide Roundup

Four-H Club members from every section of the state will assemble here June 5 for their annual statewide 4-H Roundup. The big day will be June 6 when an estimated 1,800 will be participating in 27 judging and demonstration contests.

Boys and girls who will be trying for state honors have already been named county winners and placed either first or second in their respective district elimination contests. They will be accompanied to the Roundup by their county extension agents adult leaders and/or coaches. Also in attendance will be members of the Texas 4-H Club Recognition Committee and Friends of 4-H.

The annual barbecue, sponsored by the Recognition Committee, will be the program feature for the first evening of the Roundup. Special entertainment on the second evening is also made possible by the Committee.

The contests on June 6 will get underway — some by 7 a.m. — and all will be concluded by midafternoon. Winners will be announced later in the afternoon, and several will be eligible to participate in national contests to be held later in the year.

Lunar Scientist Describes Steps In Manned Spacecraft

The first employee of the Apollo Manned Lunar Landing Program, H. Kurt Straus, recently explained the steps in the development of spacecraft operated and controlled by man to the A&M Chapter of the Institute of Aerospace Sciences and Sigma Gamma Tau, honorary Aeronautical Engineering fraternity.

Straus, who now heads the Test Facilities Branch of the NASA program in Houston, was guest speaker at the honors banquet of the group.

He said that the Apollo project to place humans on the moon was initiated on a small scale three years ago, but was not given final approval by Congress to begin a large scale operation then.

The present status of project Apollo is in suspension pending official decision on the method by which the lunar landing will be accomplished.

At this time, two methods present themselves, Straus said. The first, a landing by "Lunar Excursion Vehicle", which would be launched from a larger parent vehicle orbiting the moon, would be cheaper in terms of booster requirements.

The second method proposed is the landing of the actual spacecraft on the moon. A return launch from the moon of this vehicle would require much more fuel and a larger booster than would the first method. However, the first would entail more risk because of the greater number of parts necessary, hence, a greater possibility of failure involved, said Straus.
