Already underway with the advent of Little League baseball, the College Station Summer Recreation Program will again this year offer summer amusement to A&M students and residents of College Station. According to Mrs. James Griffin, a recreation Council member, the program is to offer a greater number of activities this year and will continue to expand in the future.

The program, which has for years accomplished the task of providing recreation for College Station youngsters, includes sports for all ages. It is sponsored by the City of College Station and the College Station United Fund.

Since they are considered residents of College Station, and since they provide many of the annual donations to the city United Fund drive, Mrs. Griffin said that students at A&M are urged by the council to take advantage of the facilities offered.

The activities to be provided by this summer's program include: adult softball, archery, Little League Baseball, bowling, a community picnic, golf, pre-school and teenage baseball, swimming, tennis, tumbling and gymnastics.

NEW YORK (AP) — The Philadelphia Warriors, starting Wilt Chamberlain, finally moved to San Francisco Wednesday.

After a month-long series of meetings, the National Basketball Association's board of governors approved the sale of the franchise for \$850,000 and the shift to San Francisco although the Boston and New York clubowners voted against it.

The seller was Eddie Gottlieb, owner of the Warriors and charter member of the NB. The buyer is a syndicate headed by Matty Simmons and Leonard Mogel, both of New York. The remaining members all are of San Francisco.

Only 19 days ago the governors debated the possibility of a transfer in several leagues. Despite the pleas of Wilt Chamberlain, the Warriors' proposal was rejected. The Gottlieb Wednesday, "he said it was a good one for the Warriors. I have put in many years of retirement and have scheduled it. Despite this, I made an effort to purchase a team in Philadelphia in the coming year but without success. I would like to see the return to the NBA in the future. Until then I am making an effort to line up some games there so that my name will be kept alive in Philadelphia this season."

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
