As Dean of Students at A&M, Hannigan has responsibility for the development and welfare of the student in areas other than academic.

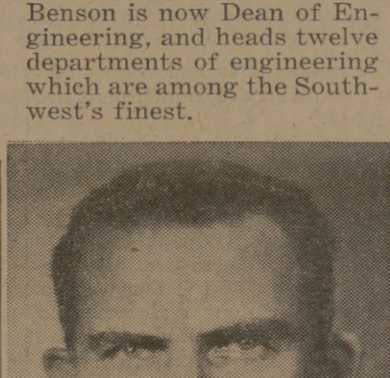
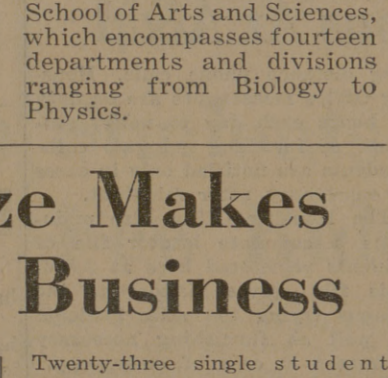
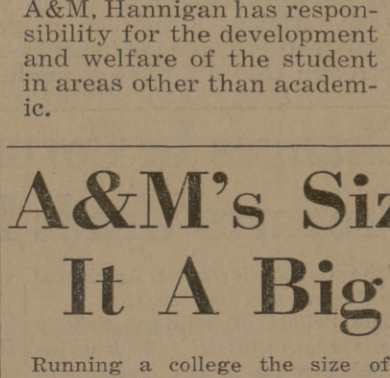
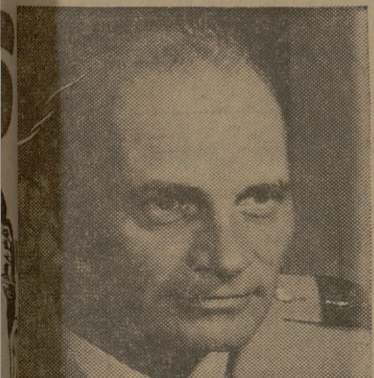
Dean F. W. R. Hubert

A&M's Size Makes It A Big Business

Running a college the size of A&M is big business.

The recent addition of over 1,900 acres which was formerly Bryan Air Force Base has brought the land holdings of the college in Brazos County to over 6,000 acres.

In addition to this area, the college has a 3,192-acre plantation in Burleson County used for experimental purposes and 411 acres in Kimble County for the Junction Adjunct.

The physical plant of the college includes buildings with a total valuation of over \$29,000,000. Included among these are the Nuclear Science Center, the Data Processing Center, the Memorial Student Center, Cushing Memorial Library, and many others.

Twenty-three single student dormitories are presently located on campus, with plans under way for at least four more. In addition, the college operates 776 apartments for married students in areas near the campus.

Sixty apartments are located in two-story buildings called the Project Houses in the South Gate Area. College View apartments are the most numerous, with 464. Recently added, 252 apartments in attractive two-story brick make up the Hensel group.

The value of the physical plant has grown to over \$50,000,000, laying a good foundation for instruction, for investigation, and for extension by means of financial aid secured from both the Congress and the State Legislature.

Board To Reveal Progress Blueprint

A&M's Board of Directors will give its report on a year-long Century Study concerning the future of A&M as a part of a convocation to be held at A&M Nov. 16, according to College President Earl Rudder.

The study was authorized on April 22 of last year, and was made up of two parts. On campus, a Faculty-Staff-Student Aspirations study was made. A separate study was made by 100 outstanding Texans who made up the Century Council.

The Board is to present statements on goals and aspirations of the college, based on these studies, in its "Blueprint for Progress" report to the people of Texas.

Former students, friends of the College and Century Council members will be honored.

At the beginning of the study, R. L. Hunt, chairman of the study, pointed out the four basic questions for which answers were being sought:

In the light of existent challenges to the state and nation, what kind of student should A&M prepare to graduate during the next 15 years?

What shall be the mission of the college and its components in the world of tomorrow?

What reasonable aspiration to academic excellence, scholarship and professional preparation shall the faculty and staff be guided by in the fulfillment of assignments in research, instruction and extension education?

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
