Richards Takes National Position

Hoy A. Richards of the Texas Transportation Institute will join the research section of the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Interstate Commerce Commission, at Washington, D.C., in September.

An assistant research economist for TTI since September 1959, Richards has been project economist on the wool transportation study conducted for the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

He will join ICC as an engineer-economist to work with a group that is re-evaluating transportation cost-formulas used by common carriers in rate litigations. Such formulas will also be used in annual reports by companies to the ICC.

Richards, who is from Temple, earned a B.S. degree in industrial

engineering here in 1959. He later received a Port of Houston Fellowship to work on his M.S. degree in economics, which he received in 1961.

HIS MASTER'S thesis was a study of plant locations and transportation costs.

As project economist on the USDA wool transportation study conducted by TTI, Richards interviewed managers of all wool processing plants throughout the west and executives of selected wool scouring plants on the east coast.

The study examined the feasibility of locating wool scouring (cleaning) plants nearer the areas of production in the west, and the cost differential in shipping weights.

Dr. Tyrus R. Timm and James E. Kirby will participate in the National Agricultural Policy Conference at Gull Lake, Michigan, Sept. 11-14.

Timm, head of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology, is a member of the National Agricultural Policy Committee, representing the southern part of the United States.

During the conference, Timm will report on a recent tour of Europe, where he headed a group of economists studying the effects of the European Common Market on U.S. agriculture.

The A&M professor will also give a paper on "Agricultural Policy Around the World."

Kirby, an economist in marketing policy with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will serve as the Texas delegate to the conference.

Carl G. Anderson, Vocational Agriculture Farm Management Specialist, is in Washington, D.C., this week to attend a national farm management conference.

Purpose of the meeting is to help develop plans for a nationwide program of instruction in farm management for vocational agriculture.

Chairman of the farm management conference is Dr. A. W. Ten-

ney, director of the Agricultural Office of Education, Division of Education Branch, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Vocational and Technical Education, Washington, D.C.

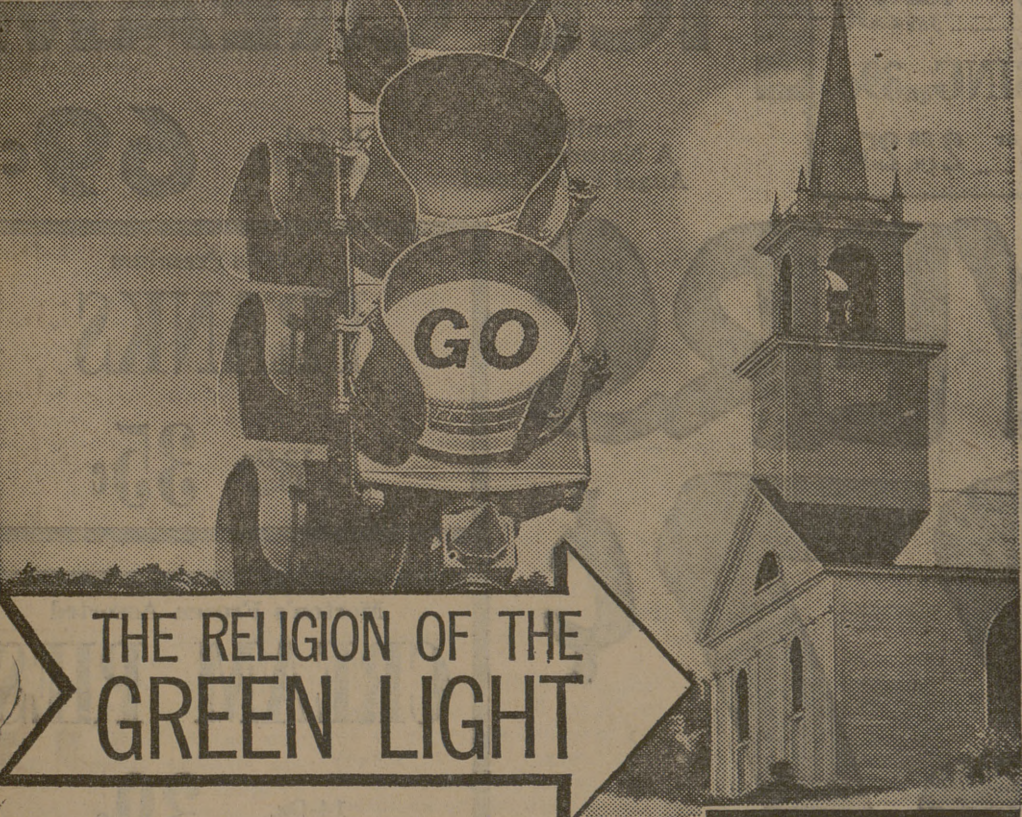
