

FOLDBERG SPEAKS

QB Club Off To Good Start

The A&M Quarterback Club of Bryan-College Station got off to a good start as 120 members and guests were in attendance to hear Houston's Morris Frank reminisce and Head Coach Hank Foldberg give a preview of the 1962 edition of the Aggie football team.

Marion Pugh, president of the

organization, called the initial meeting "a pleasing success."

Frank was at his funniest as he recalled moments in the lives of several of the former Aggie greats present, such as "Rip" Collins, pitching star for the New York Yankees for many years, and Homer Norton, who coached the Aggies to three consecutive Southwest Conference Championships in 1939-41.

Pugh and Coach Foldberg were the object of many of Frank's humorous comments, the former for losing the election for state representative and the latter for the job facing him.

Foldberg received a standing ovation as he stood up to introduce his complete staff. He complimented his staff for having adjusted well after moving down

from Wichita to A&M.

The members and guests received a rare treat as Coach Foldberg placed a long distance call to LSU Coach Charlie McClendon and all present were able to listen in via loudspeakers.

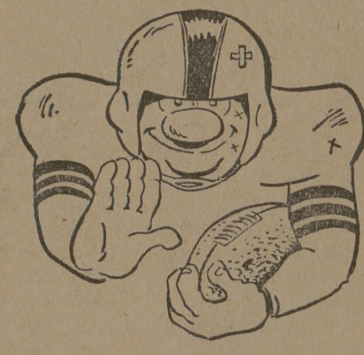
McClendon, assistant coach un-

der Paul Dietzel for eight years, described his team, ranked in pre-season polls as high as second in the nation, as "doing well, though still with many problems."

Both coaches lamented the poor weather that confronted them during fall practice. McClendon commented that "people aren't conscious of the sacrifices the players make." He closed by wishing Foldberg and the Aggs good luck and saying the Bayou Bengals would be ready for them.

Foldberg replied that the Cardinals were the "kind of boys that
