A 12-week, two-semester summer schedule of classes was reinstated at Texas University last week. Since 1959, the university has operated on a nine-week, onesemester summer schedule.

Two basic reasons were given for the change by University President Dr. Joseph R. Smiley. They were:

1. "Increasing necessity of all colleges and universities to operate as nearly as possible on a year-round basis."

2. "Increase appropriations from the Texas Commission on Higher Education, which considers only the total semester hours compiled by the student body during the year."
