Plant Sciences Tour Planned

Researchers and staffs of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will take a tour of the new Plant Sciences Building Wednesday at 3 p.m.

According to Dr. D. W. Rosberg, head of the Department of Plant Sciences, the tour is being conducted as part of the annual staff conference of the experiment station. Personnel will gather on campus Oct. 10-12 to be brought up to date on techniques and policies of the state-wide organization.

THE TOUR will begin with introductory remarks by Rosberg. Those attending will then be divided into five groups. Each group will have a leader from the faculty members who are to share the new building.

The groups will begin on different floors and complete the visit moving upward to the fourth floor and back to the basement. At each major room or laboratory in the building will be a man who is slated to carry on most of his work in that portion of the building. He will explain and demonstrate the facilities in that area.

Rosberg mentioned that the new plant disease diagnosis laboratory and the air pollution studies facilities will be of interest to the tourers. These are designed to be among the finest of those types in the world.

ACCORDING TO Rosberg, it has been found in the past that many of the people working in the off-campus branches of the experiment station are unaware of the basic and advanced research being done at headquarters. He continued that in recent years the annual conferences have included more demonstrations of work going on at A&M, through speeches

and tours such as the one Wednesday.

The four-story Plant Sciences Building is still under construction but is nearing completion, being built at a cost of \$2 million. Rosberg said the Department of Plant Sciences and other departments which are housed in the structure will be able to move in sometime in November.

CITY ORDINANCE

ORDINANCE NO. 188
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SELLING OR DISPENSING OF FLAMMABLE LIQUIDS IN UNLACKEYED CONTAINERS IN ANY SERVICE STATIONS OF GASOLINE OR OTHER FLAMMABLE LIQUIDS IN A FLASH POINT BELOW 100 FAHRENHEIT IN ANY CONTAINER OTHER THAN A METAL CONTAINER EQUIPPED WITH A CAP OR SIMILAR DEVICE SUFFICIENT TO PREVENT THE ESCAPING OF VAPOUR MAKING VIOLATIONS A MISDEMEANOR AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS OF NOT LESS THAN TEN DOLLARS NOR MORE THAN TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) OFFENSE.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, owner or manager of any service station, or dispenser of the agents, employees and servants offer to sell and dispense gasoline or other flammable liquids having a flash point below 100 degrees Fahrenheit in any container equipped with a cap or other device sufficient to prevent the escaping of vapour.

Section 2. Any person who shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and conviction thereof, shall be fined not more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) or both.

Section 3. There exists a public nuisance requiring that this ordinance be passed finally on the date of introduction, and the Mayor having in mind the safety of the citizens, he hereby declares the existence of such a nuisance and requested such passage, this ordinance shall be passed finally on the date of introduction, this 24th day of September, 1962, and shall take effect upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

ORDINANCE NO. 189

AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT PERSONAL INJURIES TO SCHOOL CHILDREN BY REGULATING THE STOPPING OF SCHOOL BUSES IN THE COLLEGE STATION, PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, it is provided in Section 6701d, Section 104, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, 1925, that the driver of a motor vehicle shall stop before passing a school bus which is in the process of receiving children, and

WHEREAS, it is desirable to protect school children when arriving at or departing from their homes to school buses,

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The driver of a motor vehicle shall stop before passing a school bus which has stopped on a street or highway for the purposes of receiving or discharging school children, and shall not proceed past such bus at a speed which is prudent, not more than ten (10) miles per hour, and shall exercise caution for the safety of the children.

SECTION 2. Any person who shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not more than (\$50.00) dollars.

SECTION 3. The fact that such ordinance commenced in College Station, Texas, at the present time, and the further passage thereof for the protection of school children, and leaving buses on the streets of the City of College Station, Texas, is hereby declared an emergency and an urgent public necessity, and it is hereby provided that this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from the date of its passage.
