A long often difficult two solid months of classes ends Wednesday with the first college holiday of the school term. Even though a few may believe the holiday is for the traditional University of Texas game, it is not. Students and faculty members will be pausing to denote one of America's oldest and most cherished holidays—Thanksgiving.

This record isn't something to be particularly proud of—no record that involves the loss of human life can be viewed with anything short of alarm.

But Aggies are now entering the period of the school year that sees the most student lives lost in automobile accidents. Upcoming are the trip to Austin for the Thanksgiving game, the trip home from Austin for a belated holiday vacation and then the trip back to school next weekend.

In three short weeks another similar holiday comes up—Christmas. And then only a few days after classes resume in 1963, the semester will end and students will be scattering to their homes again.

There really isn't much that can be done to insure safety on the state's highways. All we can do is ask that students exercise care during the upcoming holiday and keep in mind that even more care will be needed during the next two months. A slip of any kind could be fatal.

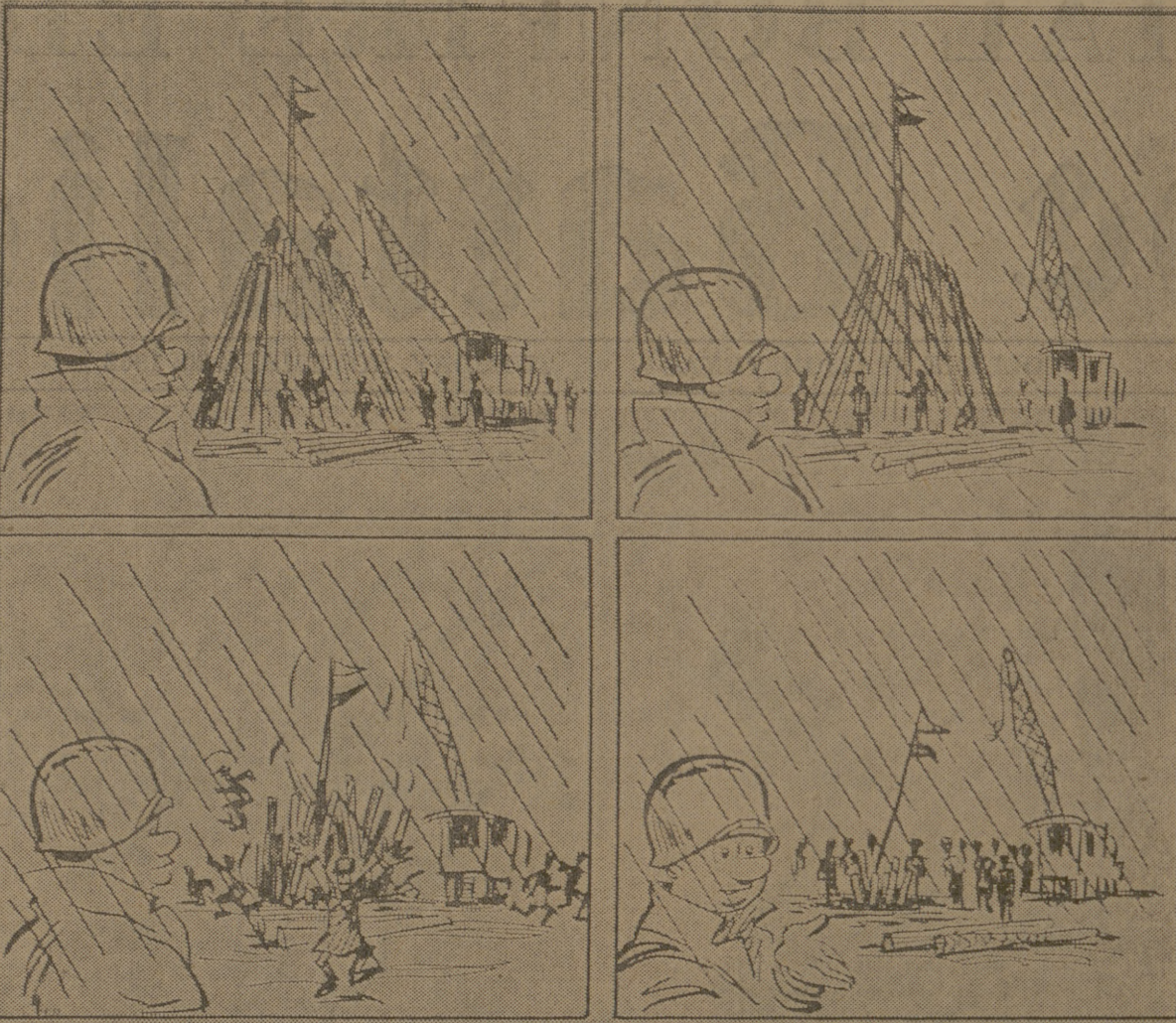
Executive officers and 1st sergeants will also have portrait made in GH cap.

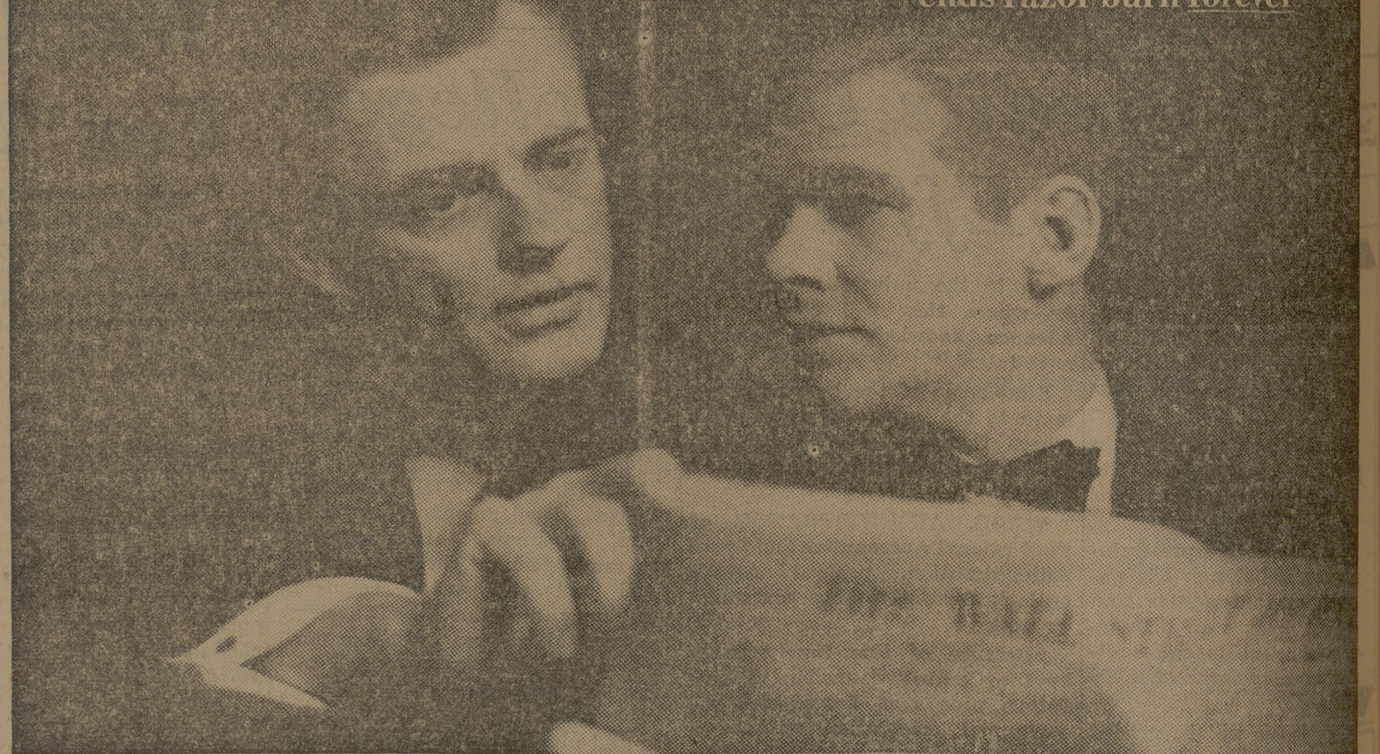

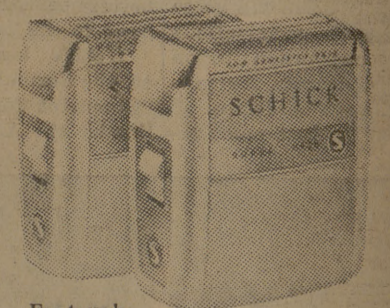

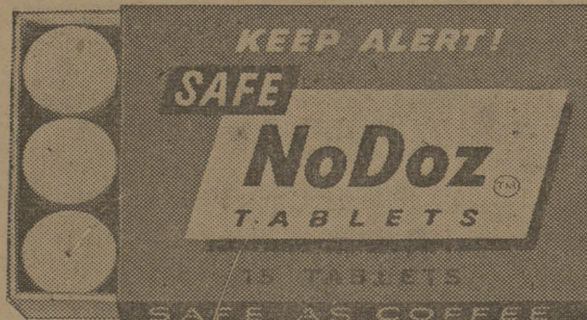
