

Listing Of Summer Jobs Now Available To Students

BROOKLYN — The new enlarged 1963 annual edition of "Summer Jobs," the largest and most comprehensive listing of actual summer jobs, compensated projects, awards, apprenticeships and permanent jobs is now available. This is the same directory used each year by over 1,500 colleges and copies can be examined at most university placement or dean's offices, college and public libraries, school superintendents' offices and U. S. employment offices.

Some of the over 25,000 unusual summer earning opportunities located throughout the United States

and over 24 foreign countries include camp counselling in Puerto Rico; acting with a Jamestown, Va., summer theatre group in an outdoor historical drama; joining a group of young people from many nations to build a road in Swedish Lapland; and supervision of Canadian Youth Hostels in Banff National Park.

This year's directory offers many student training programs and over 5,000 permanent openings in hundreds of firms such as Aerojet-General Corp., The Equitable Life Assurance Society, the Singer Sewing Machine, the Eli Lilly and Co., General Electric, the Ingersoll-Rand Co., and the Interchemical Corp.

Fellowships with the newspaper fund, compensated study projects, camp positions, jobs and apprenticeships with summer and music theatres, earning free trips to Europe, and work at resorts and dude ranches are some of the other jobs available.

Many branches of the U. S. government throughout the country, including the National Science Foundation, the Department of Interior, the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, the Bureau of Land Management, the Naval Defense Laboratory, the Department of Commerce, the Bureau of Ships,

and the Coast and Geodetic Survey, have requested their openings be included. There are also jobs for the missile minded with the Air Force Missile Center, the Special Weapons Center and the White Sands Missile Range.

Dr. James R. Sims, chairman of the Department of Civil Engineering at Rice University, will be the principal speaker at the winter banquet of the A&M chapter of Chi Epsilon Friday night.

The banquet is scheduled at 7:30 p.m. in the Triangle Restaurant. The winter initiation of nine students will be held at 5 p.m. in the Civil Engineering Building.

Ice Cream Judging Among Dairy Conference Topics

Subjects ranging from chemical residues in foods to ice cream judging and food fats will be discussed during the annual Dairy Manufacturers' Conference here next Monday through Wednesday.

An estimated 75 persons are expected to attend the sessions, which deal with the latest progress and problems of making and marketing dairy foods.

Dr. A. V. Moore, A&M dairy science professor and program chairman, said activities begin the first day at 11:30 a.m. with registration in the Memorial Student Center. Dr. R. E. Patterson, Dean of Agriculture, will deliver an address of welcome at 1:45 p.m.

Talks start at 2:15 p.m. with a discussion of "Chemical Residues in Foods" by E. E. Burns, A&M horticulturist. He will be followed by W. F. Collins of Swift and Company at Kern, N. J., speaking on "Ice Cream to Eat or to Sell?"

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A cottage cheese judging clinic will be held at 4:10 p.m. Tuesday.

That evening at 6:30, conference members will attend a banquet at which Dr. I. W. Rupel, head of the Department of Dairy Science, will give an illustrated lecture on "Dairying Around the World."

"Shelf Life Evaluation of Dairy Foods" by Lagrange will start the Wednesday discussions. Next will be "Fact and Fancy About Fat in Food," Raymond Reiser, A&M professor of biochemistry and nutrition; and "Semi-Sterile Processing of Milk and Mixes," David Hatherly, Associated Dairy Equipment Manufacturers, Everett, Mass.

The conference is sponsored by the Department of Dairy Science in co-operation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Agricultural Extension Service and Engineering Extension Service.
