Research Plant For Missiles Planned Here

A facility for conducting data systems research for missiles will be installed at A&M's Research Annex by a Dallas firm, International Data Systems Inc., company president Charles W. Skelton announced Monday.

Preliminary efforts for establishing the firm at what was formerly Bryan Air Force Base will begin immediately, according to S. E. Rowland, vice president and treasurer of the company.

The new facility will be directed by Dr. Robert M. McClure. It should contribute from \$75,000 to \$100,000 to the Bryan-College Station area during its first year of operation and should also have from 38 to 52 employees, according to Rowland.

A&M is furnishing space for the company's installation in support of Bryan-College Station efforts to bring new industry into the area.
