A new semester began this week, with the rush and frustration of another registration session still far from completed. And incomplete reports by midweek indicated that total enrollment would show an increase over enrollment at the same time last year.

By Wednesday, Registrar H. L. Heaton reported 7,191 students registered. Last year spring enrollment totaled 6,782. And registration proceedings are still underway — students may register through Saturday and have until next Wednesday to drop courses

Dean of Student James P. Hannigan also disclosed that the dropout total was not as high as many persons had first anticipated. Complete figures in this category are also incomplete.

Housing problems were reportedly held to a minimum, with stuon personal request.

UT Wins Big **Cage Highlighter**

The new semester started on a sour note for Coach Bob Rogers' basketballers when league-leading Texas riddled the Aggie defense from long range in taking a vital 70-59 SWC cage contest in G. Rollie White Coliseum. The loss dropped the Cadets into a tie for third place, three big games behind the galloping Longhorns. The defeat was also A&M's first in G. Rollie White in the last 31 games.

Guards Jimmy Gilbert and Jimmy Puryear led the Steer longrange attack with 3 and 19 points, respectively. The league leaders hit a resounding 55.1 per cent of their floor shots.

High-scoring Aggie guard Bennie Lenox led all scorers with 26 points. Lee Walker, with 15 points, was the only other Cadet to tally in double figures.




