Trustees of the Dallas university and the Dallas Baptist Association Executive Board invited the college Jan. 21 to move to Dallas. Decatur trustees voted 19-0 in favor of the proposal.

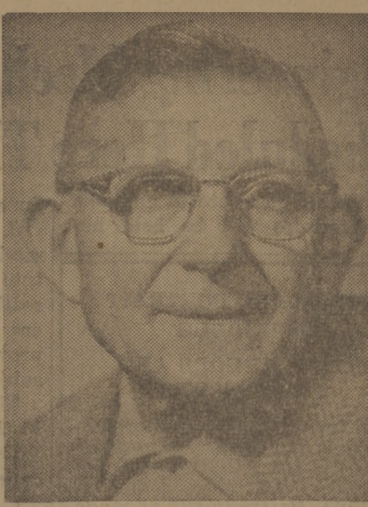
Run Over By Stationwagon, He Thought He Was One!

A. L. Rosprim To Retire

A long-time college Poultry Science employee — Antone L. Rosprim — will retire March 1.

Antone, as his associates call him, started to work on the A&M poultry farm in 1920, more than 40 years ago and about three years before the Department of Poultry Science was organized.

Dr. J. H. Quisenberry, department head, said that as far as he knows, Antone's length of service without interruption is a record for the department.

He said an open house will be held from 9 to 11 a.m. next Tuesday at the Poultry Center in honor of the veteran employee. Refreshments will be served and everyone is invited.

Antone's duties have varied during his 43 years on the farm. At present, he handles grading, candling, packing and shipping of eggs. He was graduated from Bryan High School in 1918.

TO ADMINISTRATORS New Mexico Prof To Speak Here

Dr. Paul V. Petty from the University of New Mexico will be one of the principal speakers at a state-wide conference of school administrators and supervisors scheduled here June 10-12.

The announcement was made Thursday by Dr. Paul Hensarling, general chairman of the conference and head of the Department of Education and Psychology.

APPROXIMATELY 500 persons are expected to attend the conference, sponsored by the Texas Association of County Superintendents, the Texas School Administrators Association and the Texas Association of Instructional Supervisors.

Petty, chairman of the Department of Educational and Administrative Services, is a professor of education at the University of New Mexico.

He will speak during a general assembly on the second day of the conference, with "Obstacles to Curriculum Improvement" being the announced topic. He also will serve as consultant to school administrators and supervisors in their group sessions.

PETTY'S PROFESSIONAL career includes service at virtually all levels from the rural school to the university classroom. He received his undergraduate degree from Arkansas State College in 1936, the M.A. degree from the University of New Mexico in 1941 and the Ph.D. from the University of Texas in 1951.

He has served in the U.S. Navy as the author of a number of publications and is a Rotarian.

Petty lists membership in Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta, American Association of School Administrators, American Educational Research Association, National Conference of Professors of Educational Administration, National Educational Association, American Academy of Political Science and the American Association of University Professors.

Ft. Sam C.O. Gives Warning 'Show Respect'

SAN ANTONIO (AP)—An Army general ordered soldiers and civilians at Ft. Sam Houston to show more respect for the U. S. flag Thursday and indicated they might be arrested if they do not.

Maj. Gen. Ralph Mace, commander of the post, said his order applies during retreat — the ceremony that goes with lowering the National Ensign at day's end.

Mace said soldiers or civilians who disregard his order might find themselves charged before the U.S. Commissioner. But he did not say what the charge might be.

Ft. Sam Houston, not far from downtown San Antonio, has a number of civilian employees. Civilians can also drive on the big post without a pass.

Mace said his order applies to the neighborhood of the post headquarters, where the retreat ceremony takes place.

Houston Stakes 2nd Land Claim

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston has staked a second annexation claim to a 1,100 square mile area in Harris County.

The City Council gave unanimous approval Wednesday night to the second reading of an ordinance originally adopted June 22, 1960. A third reading is needed.

City Atty. Richard Burks indicated the second reading was prompted by the recent incorporation of several areas near the \$200 million Manned Spacecraft Center 25 miles east of Houston.

State Military Code Urged By Solons

AUSTIN (AP) — Sens. Charles Herring of Austin and A. R. Schwartz of Galveston introduced a bill Thursday which would revise Texas' military statutes.

Schwartz said the bill would codify the statutes and bring them up to date.
