### Walker, Qualls, Windham Play Swan Song Friday

Aggie fans will get their last chance to watch this year's cagers and three seniors in particular in action Friday in G. Rollie White Coliseum against Texas Tech. The three ending their college careers are centers Lee Walker and Lew Qualls and forward Jerry Windham.

WALKER, undoubtedly the most improved player on the team, has started every game for the Cadets this season. He pulled down 167 rebounds in season play and 103 for the defence campaign. This is quite an increase over the 63 he garnered last season while playing in all but three of the Aggies' games.

The scoring column shows a comparable increase with Walker hitting 214 points in 22 games and 134 in SWC play. This season he scored 48 points for the season and 11 against defence foes.

QUALLS, for three years the tallest player in the conference, has performed well for the Ags, gaining most of his under the basket. A big favorite with the fans, Qualls also exceeded his junior year output by a large margin. The current season shows the Houston (Smiley) senior 19.7 rebounds and 95 points compared with 63 rebounds and 35 points for the '61-'62 season.

WINDHAM, senior from Hamilton, deserves a lot of the credit for the Aggies' good showing this year. Out three times with a leg injury and playing a new position—forward lead of center—he still leads the team in rebounding and second in scoring.

Jerry gained all-conference honors in '61-'62 and is a good to repeat this year. He has grabbed off 204 rebounds in games and has netted 249 points.

All three have the distinction of playing with the two best scoring cagers to wear the Maroon and White—roll Broussard and Bennie Lenox. And it is certain that the men realize that without the rebounding talents of the three giants, their multitude of points would have been behind reach.

The trio will be missed and all Aggies and Aggie fans could be at the game Friday to show their appreciation for job well done.

## More Than 30 Gridders Sign From Schoolboy Ranks

The signing of two highly-rated halfbacks and a fullback by assistant football coach Neil Schmidt brought A&M's total of schoolboy gridders recruited to over 30.

Halfback George Schutze and fullback Sherman Debusk from Austin were two of Schmidt's catches. Schutze led the city in punting with 55 kicks for a 36.3 average. Weighing 170 pounds, he carried the ball 34 times and gained 216 yards.

Debusk, a 190-pounder, paced the city's rushers with 199 carries for 776 yards and a 3.9 average for the district champion Austin High Maroons.

The other halfback is Katy's

Jerry Gipson, 6-2, 170 pounds. Gipson ran the ball 111 times for 715 yards as well as snagging 13 passes for an additional 261 yards. He scored 11 touchdowns though missing two games with an injury.

Head Coach Hank Foldberg estimated the size of the 1963 freshman squad to be 40 gridders. Although only 30 have been announced, more have been signed and more announcements are expected to be forthcoming.

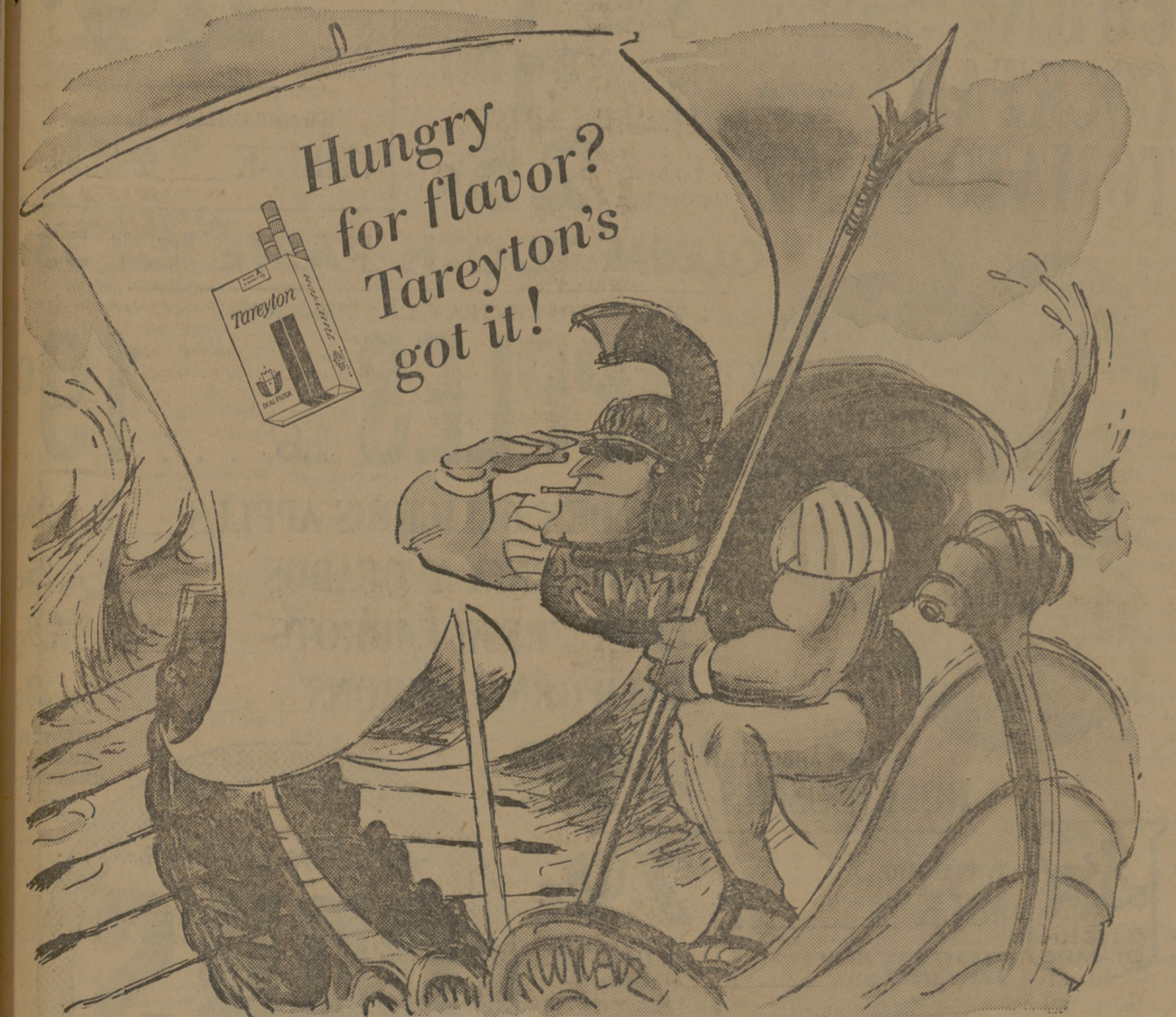
