

Photo Techniques Studied At Meet

Improved techniques in photography and newspaper production are being presented at the 14th annual Newspaper Mechanical Conference, in the Memorial Student Center Friday and Saturday.

The conference, sponsored by the Texas Press Association and the Department of Journalism, is being attended by representatives from weekly and daily Texas newspapers.

Harry Ritter, conference director and journalism instructor, said invitations had been sent to 625 Texas newspapers.

Among the speakers are Art Uhlman, Houston Chronicle chief photographer; John Hoffman of New York City, director of the Research Institute of the American

can Newspaper Publishers Association; Phil McMullan, Garland News Publisher; and William Barr, operator of a job printing firm in Fort Worth.

A photo-shooting session this afternoon was followed with a two-hour panel discussion on better newspaper photography, followed by a printing session. Panel members were Uhlman, a prize-winning photographer, and representatives from photo equipment and supply firms.

The mechanical phase of the conference will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday. At noon a dinner is planned.

Frank Tucker, manager of the A&M Press, will moderate a panel entitled "What's New?" The discussion will involve 20 participants, Ritter said.

Offset press technique will be a prominent topic among Saturday's speakers. Hoffman will discuss the results of a recent study on competitive costs of offset and letterpress — research institute's techniques for improving newspaper methods.

Editor McMullan will discuss his paper's change to offset printing. McMullan's facilities have been a model for newspapers changing to offset production.

The word offset comes from the process of "offsetting" the image from a plate to a blanket before coming in contact with the paper. The offset technique enables excellent picture reproduction.

Several photo manufacturers and equipment suppliers will have displays of their latest products.

NASA Official Plans Lecture On U.S. Space Explorations

A National Aeronautics and Space Administration official will lecture at 8 p.m. Monday on "The U.S. Space Exploration Program."

Bernard Maggin will speak in the Biological Sciences lecture room as part of the graduate lecture series.

Maggin received the Bachelor of Science degree in aeronautical engineering from Wayne University in 1962 and has since worked for the government.

He was employed upon graduation by the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics at the Langley Aeronautical Laboratory, now the NASA Langley Research Center. He then worked in the fields of aeronautical stability and control and rocket-model research.

In 1947 Maggin moved up to the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics headquarters.

He headed the NASA Flight Mechanics Group between 1958 and 1961 and since has been on the staff of NASA's Associate Administrator in the Office of Technical Programs.

Alpha Phi Omega Chapter To Accept New Pledges

Schools Open Next Week For Parents

Public schools in the A&M Consolidated school system will observe Public Schools Week next week with open house and student programs.

All parents have been invited to the programs, which begin Monday when College Hills Elementary School will hold a reception at 6 p.m., with an open house afterward.

The consolidated schools will be open Tuesday, beginning with the elementary school at 6 p.m., followed by the junior high school at 7 p.m. At 8 p.m. the high school will sponsor abbreviated class periods. All visitors will be given badges saying they have attended Public Schools Week.

Eight hundred to 1,000 visitors are expected to attend, said Fred R. Brison, general chairman of Public Schools Week.

Public Schools Week, said College Station Mayor Ernest Langford, was chosen "as a time for all citizens to visit their public schools and observe accomplishments and needs, with the objectives of seeking excellence in facilities, excellence in academic offerings and training for citizenship and equal opportunities for all children."

Crooked hole problems will be studied at the two-week Advanced Drilling Engineering Course opening next Monday on campus.

Other subjects at the eight course session include rocks and rock properties, circulating fluids in the bore hole, drilling strings, rotary drilling bits and maintenance of the desired direction of the drilled bore hole.

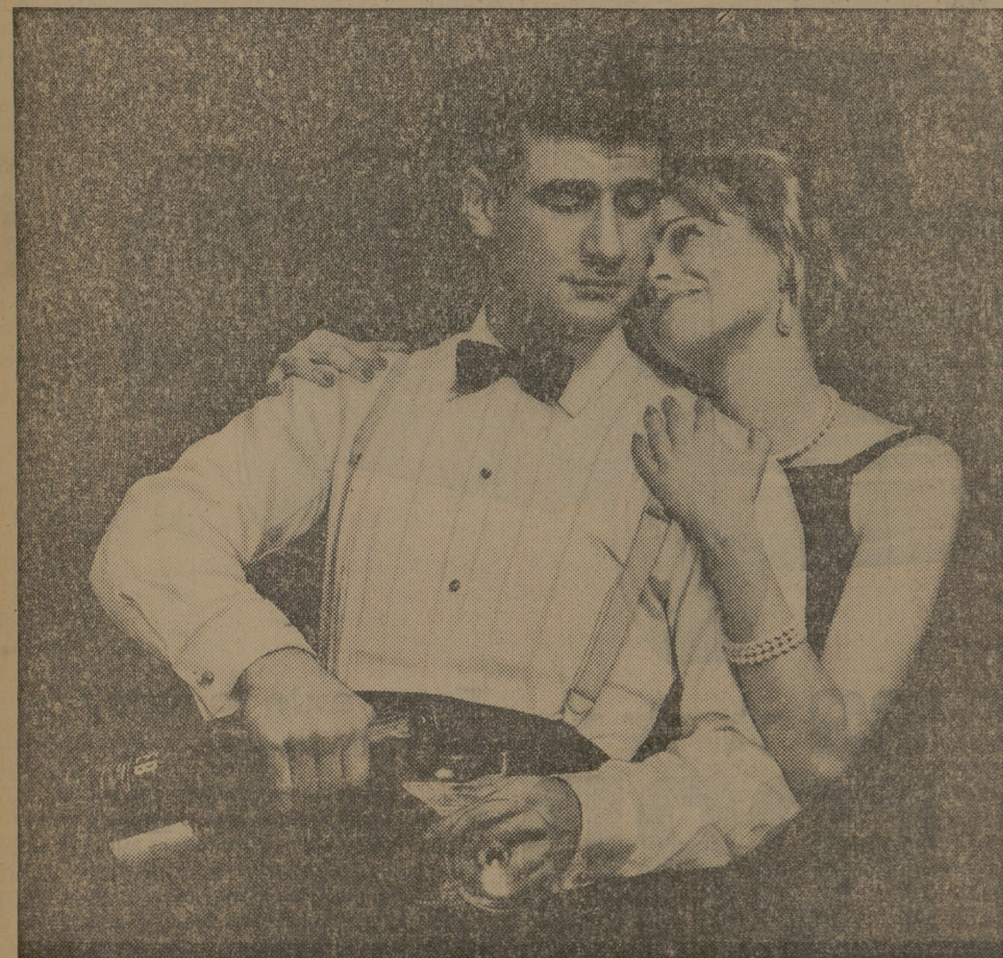
