

# Flying Cadets Plan To Enter Contest

Eight members of the Flying Kadets will take off before dawn March 24 from Easterwood Field and fly to Carbondale, Ill., to represent A&M at the annual National Flying Meet.

The meet, sponsored by the National Flying Association, will be the 15th in a series. College and university flying clubs from all over the United States will participate.

Jack Threadgill, president of the local club, said the Kadets plan to arrive about noon. That evening a safety lecture will be held to familiarize all entrants with the

local flying conditions. COMPETITIVE flying will begin the second day and will include four events—a 180-degree power-on spot landing, a 180-degree power-off side approach spot landing, bomb dropping and a fourth event chosen each year by the host school.

Skill, safety and sport are the N.I.F.A.'s main objectives. Members range from commercial pilots to those who are just learning to fly.

Officials from the Federal Aviation Agency and N.I.F.A. officials will judge these events.

TROPHIES ARE presented to the five top teams, and individual, permanent and rotating trophies are awarded to the five top pilots of the five top events.

Awards will go to the outstanding man and woman pilot and to the club flying the greatest number of passenger air miles enroute to the meet. A safety award will be given to the team showing the greatest amount of care in handling its aircraft.

# Open House Slated For Vet Library

The faculty wives of the School of Veterinary Medicine will sponsor an open house in the school's 14-year-old library during National Library Week in April, Mrs. Nan Cardwell, librarian, has announced.

No definite date has been set for the open house, which will be held for the third straight year.

The Veterinary Library, a branch of A&M's College Library System that primarily serves biology, pre-

medical, and veterinary students open to all students.

Located in the east wing of Veterinary Medicine Building, seats 60 and is open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. on weekdays and 8 a.m.-noon on Saturdays.

OPENING IN 1949 with 533 books and 678 bound periodicals, the library has grown to more than 10,000 volumes.

Each week more than 500 students visit the library, Mrs. Cardwell said.

"We have sort of a home atmosphere. The boys know we are here to serve them, and are free to browse," she went on.

Mrs. Cardwell, in her fifth year as veterinary librarian here, came from Huntsville. Before coming to A&M, she worked at the Fort Air Force Base Library. She attended Sam Houston State Teachers College, Hollins College, Virginia and the University of Texas.

Assistant to Mrs. Cardwell is Miss Martha Pohl. Tom Dineen serves as student assistant.

THE VETERINARY LIBRARY is a member of the Medical Library Association Exchange, which state and national libraries belong to. The annual membership fee entitles the library to secure volumes for only their postage rates.

Each member of the exchange submits a list of its duplicate volumes. After the lists are compiled into a composite list, patrons may select volumes from the list. The A&M library has some 400 volumes available for the exchange program.

The library also belongs to the Inter-Library Loan Service through which Mrs. Cardwell said "We can always get what our patrons want."

Also through the Bibliographic Center in Denver, the library has access to an unlimited supply of books and periodicals.

INCLUDED IN the some 40 journals to which the branch subscribes are 40 foreign publications in 20 different languages.

Serving on the Veterinary Library Committee are Dr. E. Turk, chairman, Dr. A. G. Kemp and Dr. R. W. Moore, along with Mrs. Cardwell.

"Visitors from all over the United States claim that the library is one of the best veterinary libraries in the nation," Mrs. Cardwell pointed out.
