

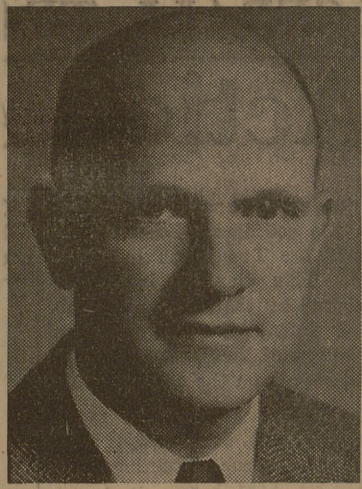
Sigma Xi To Host Lecture On Taste

Two MSC Pistols Go To Washington

Two pistols from the Memorial Student Center's Metzger Gun Collection will be displayed at the National Rifle Association Convention in Washington, D. C., later this month.

The Colt pistols, the first of their respective models, will be part of a display of rare weapons representing Texas, Harry C. Knode of Dallas, one of the Metzger collection curators, said.

Capt. John R. Vilas, collection chairman, said one weapon is the Colt Patterson belt model, often called the "Texas Patterson" be-

cause of its popularity with Texas Rangers and the U. S. Army in the war with Mexico. The date on the pistol is 1837.

The other weapon is the Colt Double Action Revolver of the "Police Positive" series. It is a 1905 model.

Knode will take the pistols to Washington, along with 12 confederate swords, a miniature gun collection and other No. 1 Colt weapons.

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Michigan State Physicist To Conduct Three Lectures

Dr. Richard Schlegel, professor of physics at Michigan State University, will deliver a graduate lecture at 8 p.m. next Tuesday in Room 146 of the Physics Building.

Schlegel is well known for his writings on the philosophy of physics, cosmology and theoretical physics, according to Dr. James G. Potter, head of the Department of Physics.

Among his published works is his recent book "Time and the Physical World," and his treatises pertaining to physics in the Encyclopedia Britannica.

SCHLEGEL HAS the degrees of AB from the University of Chicago, MA from the University of Iowa and Ph.D. from the University of Illinois.

He also spent two years in the Department of Physics at Cambridge University.

During the war he was on the staff of the Manhattan Project, well known for its studies culminating in the Atomic bomb.

He has also been on the staff of the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago.

PRIOR TO JOINING the faculty at Michigan State, Schlegel was on the faculty at Princeton Uni-

versity.

Schlegel will also lecture before physics majors, and participants in the National Science Foundation's Academic Year Institute for junior high school teachers and others interested, at 11:30 a.m. in Room 321 of the Physics Building. His subject will be "Perspectives in Cosmology."

At 4 p.m. that same afternoon he will speak at the Department of Physics Colloquium in Room 146.

PAFFMANN CONTENDS the sense of taste is more than a matter of pleasant or unpleasant sensation. Taste also may control behavior, he says.

The speaker's chief interests are in the psychology of taste, sensory processes and chemical senses. In 1934, he was awarded the Howard Crosby Warren Medal by the Society of Experimental Psychologists for his research.

He received all his degrees in psychology. They include the BA in 1933 and the M.Sc. in 1935 at Brown University. Another BA was earned in 1937 from Oxford University in England, and his doctorate was awarded in 1939 at Cambridge University in England.

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Thomas Lawrence, a junk dealer, found \$21,900 in a box of trash Sunday, then hid the money in a safe.

Lawrence's son-in-law, Frank Deane, 27, dashed out the door Sunday night to get a gun after the money and fired at two teen-agers he thought were the bandits, he said. Robert Lawrence, 16, was wounded in the arms, legs and back.

Neither Lawrence nor his companion, William Doll, 17, took part in the robbery, Patrolman Chester said.

Detective Harold Craften said the money belonged to Joseph Heston, 82, a retired businessman, who didn't believe in banks.
