

Ags Fall To Sul Ross, 8-4, For Second Baseball Defeat

A&M's varsity baseballers suffered their second defeat of the 1963 season Tuesday afternoon, 8-4, at the hands of the Sul Ross Lobos on Kyle Field.

Paul Pasqua, listed as a catcher on the Lobo roster, played left field Tuesday and connected for two singles and a homer. The 198-pound sophomore from Dallas chalked up four runs batted in for the Alpine school.

THE DEFEAT left the Ags all-even with Sul Ross after they de-

feated the Lobos, 10-1, Monday. Coach Tom Chandler's Cadets now own a 3-2-1 record. They will meet Baylor at 3 p.m. Saturday on Kyle Field.

Centerfielder Ray Hall was the big gun for the Aggies. He drove in himself and two others in the bottom of the sixth inning with a home run that bounced against the football stadium despite a strong wind. The round-tripper left him one for four for the afternoon.

First baseman Frank Stark had

two hits for the Cadets in four at bats. He stroked singles in the first and sixth innings.

SHORTSTOP JERRY Ballard, rightfielder Robert McAdams pinch-hitter Bill Puckett and starting pitcher Chuck McGuire each had a hit against the Lobos. McGuire's was a double in the fifth and Puckett's gave him an RBI in the eighth.

Sul Ross catcher Daryle Gibbons had two RBIs on sacrifice flies and third baseman Jim Sears drove the last two Lobo runs across with his only hit of the afternoon, a long single.

Lobo centerfielder Bud Antwine and shortstop Wilbur Huckle had singles in the fifth and eighth innings, respectively.

Charles Stingle, who came in at the top of the seventh, was the winning pitcher. He relieved Travis Thompson after Thompson had finished an inning for starter Jerry Tyson.

McGUIRE went seven full innings for the Aggies. Richard Beller pitched two-thirds of the eighth inning and then the loser for the Ags, Ronald Byrd, took over hurling chores.

Stingle gave up one run on two hits. He walked one man and struck out two. Byrd gave up five runs on two hits and two free trips. He struck out one man. Duane Brandt, a soph who had been playing third base, relieved Byrd in the ninth and retired the side with one man on base after an error.

A&M had seven hits to six for the Lobos. Each team had two errors.

Fencers Beat Longhorns, Play Rice Here Saturday

the Rice University fencers here at 3:30 p.m. Saturday. The match will be held in the fencing room of G. Rollie White Coliseum.

Competing for the Aggies were Bryant Wilson of Fort Stockton (1-2), Wyatt Anderson of Austin (3-1), Eudoro Galindo of Bolivia (3-0), Alvaro Restrepo of Columbia (3-1), Joe Becera of Ft. Worth (1-0) and Hogue Lewis of San Antonio (0-1).

Coach Russell K. Wieder announced earlier that the team will fence in four meets this spring.

The squad travels to Houston March 30 to test Rice and will close its season April 6 against the Longhorns at Austin. All fencing is done with foils.

In tennis play Tuesday Sqd. 14 took victory from E-1, which is currently leading in Class A intramurals.

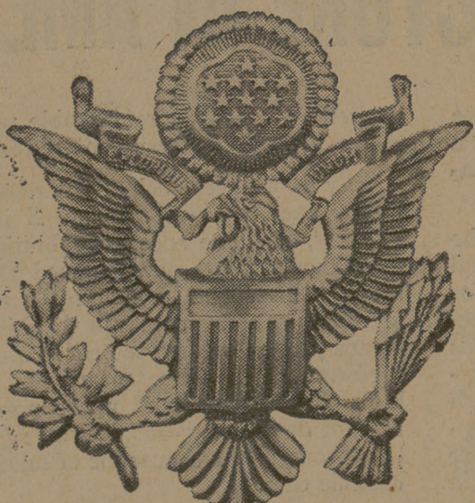
Other results in Class A tennis were Sqd. 5 over B-3; College View over Mitchell Hall, and Milner Hall over Hart Hall.

Jim Keller was also praised for his linebacking and punting.

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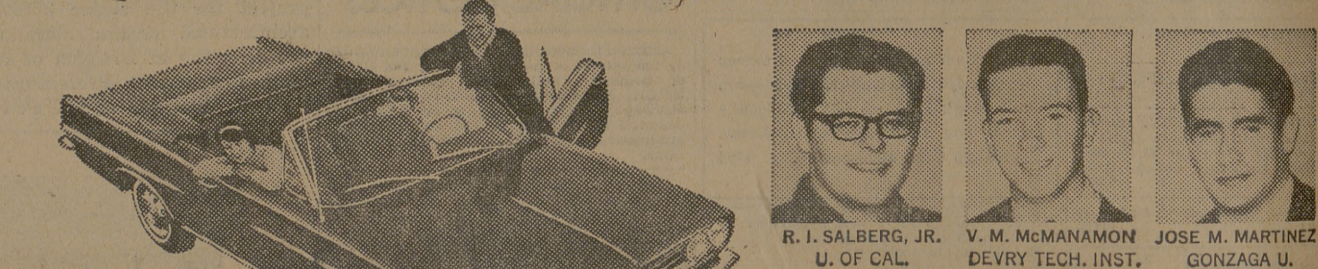
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
