Netters Play In Rice Meet After Defeating ACC, 7-0

Coach Omar Smith's Aggies tennis team is away from home this weekend, participating in the Rice Intercollegiate Tournament that began Thursday.

The Cadet netters sport a 4-5 record after defeating Abilene Christian College, 7-0, on the A&M courts Wednesday.

The Ags won five singles and two doubles matches against ACC.

Richard Barker defeated Dave Nix, 6-1, 6-1; Carroll Kell beat John Nelson, 6-0, 7-5; Doug Sassen defeated David Osborne, 6-0, 6-0; Dean Dyer beat Jackie Wilson, 6-1, 6-3; and Bob Neal defeated Terry Bishop, 6-0, 6-1.

In the doubles competition Sassen-Albert Aldrich beat Osborne-Nix, 6-2, 6-2; and Neal-Dyer defeated Nelson-Wilson, 6-1 6-1.

Seventy-seven netters, 52 of them varsity and 25 freshmen, are competing for four titles in the Houston meet. Fifteen schools are represented at the tourney, including all the Southwest Conference squads except SMU and Arkansas.

The nationally-ranked Trinity Tigers of San Antonio are figured

to dominate the tournament. A&M has already been shutout, 7-0, by Trinity.

Chuck McKinley and Frank Froeling of the Tigers, ranked one and two respectively in the U.S. men's singles standings, will lead Trinity in its defense of the meet title.

Elgin Baylor Is Top Star

NEW YORK (AP) — Elgin Baylor of the Los Angeles Lakers was the lone unanimous choice on the National Basketball Association's 1962-63 All-Star team, announced Thursday.

Other members of the team, picked by sports writers and broadcasters around the league, are: Bob Pettit, St. Louis; Bill Russell, Boston; Jerry West, Los Angeles, and Oscar Robertson, Cincinnati.

Terry Dischinger of Chicago was selected Rookie of the Year.

Fish, Varsity Face Baylor In Waco, At Home Saturday

Both Fish and varsity baseballers tangle with Baylor teams Saturday. Coach Tom Chandler's Cadets will play Baylor on the Kyle Field diamond at 3 p.m. and the freshmen meet the Cubs in Waco at the same time.

Dutch Schroeder's Bears will bring a 0-1 record to Aggieland, after having lost to Rice 6-3 Thursday afternoon in the first conference outing for both teams.

After Tuesday's loss to the Sul Ross Lobos, the A&M varsity has a 3-3-1 history for the season. They've played one SWC game against Texas that had to be called at a 5-5 tie because of no lights at the Austin park. As far as the conference is concerned, that one will count as no game won or lost but the statistics will be recorded.

Chandler is expected to start right hander Chuck McGuire of Dallas, who leads Aggie hurlers with a 2-0 record.

Among the Aggie regulars, outfielders Ray Hall and Robert McAdams and first baseman Frank Stark have been the most pro-

ductive men at the plate. McAdams leads the team with three home runs. He is currently hitting .207 and has four RBIs.

Stark's batting average is .311. The junior from Davenport, Iowa, has a pair of homers and four RBIs. Hall and catcher Bill Puckett lead the team in RBIs with seven each.

The big centerfielder is batting .308 and has two homeruns. Last season's SWC batting champ, Bill Hancock is currently hitting .115 and has two round-trippers and six RBIs. Hancock, a junior from Shreveport, La., started the season at third base but has seen most of his recent action behind the plate.

Puckett, shortstop leftfielder Gary Cavasas and McGuire are all hitting .333.

The Fish own a 2-0 record for the season, with both wins coming at the expense of Bryan's Allen Academy Ramblers. They clipped Allen 5-4 in the opener two weeks ago on Kyle Field.

Tuesday afternoon at Travis Park, the Fish managed to hold out long enough to take a 3-2 win

over the Ramblers. They had been scheduled to open against the Texas Yearlings Saturday but were rained out.

Track Team Will Meet Rice, LSU In Houston Triangular

A&M's varsity track team will meet Rice in Houston again this weekend in a triangular meet that will include LSU.

The Cadets defeated Rice and Texas at a three-way affair in the Bayou City March 2.

Coach Charles Thomas' lads will be coming from two straight weeks of overall second-place finishes behind undefeated Abilene Christian College—first at the Border Olympics and last weekend at the West Texas Relays.

In both of those meets the Ags topped Rice by big margins and were seriously threatened by Baylor only.

AGGIE SOPH Louis Poland will have his hands full in the pole vault with Rice's Fred Hansen and Warren Brattlof expected to turn in their usual only-two performance.

The only big opposition to the Ags from Rice will come from ace javelin thrower Ed Red.

Danny Roberts, who has been defeated only once this year in an indoor meet at Lubbock, will lead the Aggie efforts in the weight events. The big junior from Cleveland was overall high-point man at the Rice-Texas-A&M triangular, with wins in the shot put and discus.

Soph speedster Ted Nelson is expected to corner the 440-yard dash market. The Andrews flash has yet to be defeated in that event this season.

A&M WILL be strong in the two relays events. Robert Martin, Nel-

son, R. E. Merritt and George Tedford have already tied the school record in the 440-yard relay with a 41.4 time at the Border Olympics.

In the one-mile relay, Merritt, John Collins, Jerry Anderson and Nelson turned in a flashy 3:3.5 winning time at Odessa last weekend.

Collins will also help the Cadets in the high jump. He won that event at the earlier Houston outing with a 6-6 3/4 jump.

The A&M Judo Club will have a meet with the James Connolly Air Force Base (Waco) team Saturday morning at 9:15. The teams will vie in the wrestling room on the second floor of the G. Rollie White Coliseum annex.
