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IN AERO MEET

'Eccentric Holes' Wins Carey Award

Gerald J. Carey, graduate student in the Department of Aerospace Engineering tied for first place in the recent North Texas section of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics 15th annual Student Paper Competition at Fort Worth.

Carey, a native of Brooklyn, N.Y., tied with Gordon L. Harris of Mississippi State University. His paper was titled "An Analysis of Plastic Torsion in Circular Cross Section with Eccentric

Holes."

The paper will next be judged on a national basis by the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics.

Charles A. Rodenberger, associate professor of aerospace engineering, said the event is supported by the major aerospace companies in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, and one of its purposes is to create closer industry-faculty-student relations.

He said other purposes of the contest are to encourage contribution of technical papers in the aerospace field; reward the engineering student through recognition of technical accomplishment and expert evaluation; emphasize the vital role of the engineering faculty in developing future engineers; and focus attention on aerospace activities in the Southwest.

In addition to Texas and Mississippi, states represented by other colleges and universities in the contest were Colorado, Utah, Kansas, Louisiana, Indiana, and Oklahoma.

Parachute Council To Hold Meet Here

The second annual Texas Parachute Council meeting will be held this week-end at the Memorial Student Center.

Dr. Edward Fitch, surgeon from Houston, is president of the organization.

The purpose of the group is to regulate sport parachuting in Texas.

Calhoun Selected As Aid To Udall

Dr. John C. Calhoun, vice chancellor for development, will leave A&M about May 1 to become science advisor to Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall.

In explaining his reason for taking a leave at this time, he said, "My leave could serve as an opportunity for A&M to contribute to the overall Washington scene in the same way that other universities, notably Harvard, are useful to the federal government." He said it would be an on-the-scene

refresher in keeping abreast of how industry and the government are operating today.

"Universities are sources of talent that the government wisely makes use of, and it is gratifying to us that A&M is able to contribute," he commented.

In jobs as complicated as that of Secretary Udall's, expert advisors in many fields are necessary in order to fulfill his responsibilities.

Calhoun has a leave of absence that will last one year. He said he would decide at the end of the year whether it would profit A&M more if he stayed on in his advisory capacity, or whether it would be better to return to his present job as vice-chancellor of development.

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
