

Track Records In Trouble As Texas Hosts A&M, Rice

AUSTIN (AP)—Ten meet records may fall Thursday night when Texas hosts Rice and A&M in a triangular track and field meet. Freshman teams from the three schools also will participate. Records in danger include the

440-yard dash 46.1, the 880-yard run 1:50.0, 330-yard intermediate hurdles 38.4, two-mile run 9:19.9, mile relay 3:12.0, shot put 57-1 1/2, discus 167-11 1/2, high jump, 6-6 3/4, Javelin 226-7 1/2 and pole vault 15-5.

Texas' Roy Gunter could break his own record in the half and John Eschle of Texas could smash the two-mile. He owns a share of it.

Both Bobby May of Rice and Rex Wilson of Texas have consistently been under the 330 hurdles mark.

A&M could lower the mile relay mark.

A&M's weightman — Danny Roberts — easily could raise the shot and discus marks. He has consistently been over both marks this spring and hit a personal high of 59-3 1/2 in the Texas Relays.

A&M also has a fine high jumper in John Collins.

Rice's Fred Hansen and Ed Red should raise the standards in the pole vault and javelin. Hansen hit 16-1 in the Texas Relays and has been over 15-6 seven times this spring. Red has hit 260 in the spear throw and has always been over 225.

Johnny Crain will handle the pitching chores against the Bruins in Saturday's tilt.

Standings were changed as a result of Tuesday's games and the conference race is much closer than before.

Coach Chandler commented on the situation:

"We have our backs to the wall right now. TCU is definitely in the driver's seat as far as the conference goes."

"Of course," Chandler said, "Texas is a half a game ahead, but they have a tough schedule the rest of the season. And, we have a very tough schedule, playing two games with Baylor and three with Texas."

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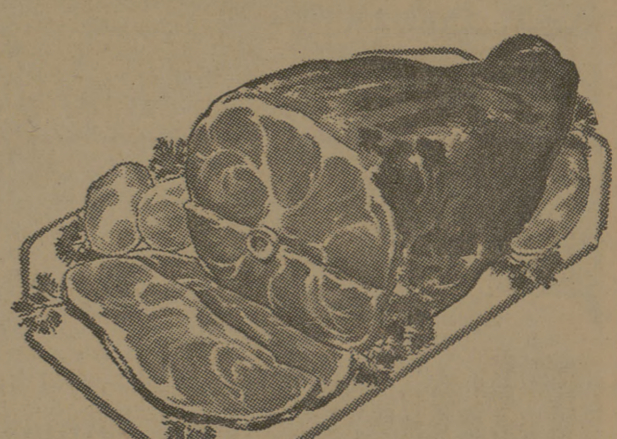
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
