

Highschool Grads Use Poor Reasoning, Writing Methods

Dr. Lee J. Martin, associate professor in the Department of Engineering, is the author of an article in the May issue of Texas Outlook titled "College Bound: Are They Ready?"

Texas Outlook is the official publication of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Martin's article surveys two major reasons for poor performance in college of many apparently well-prepared high school graduates: Lack of training in systematic techniques of thinking through problems, and inability to communicate realistically in written assignments.

The agreement calls for evaluation of feed additives to be used in feeds for broilers, replacement pullets, turkeys and laying hens.

From Springfield, Couch will go to Chicago to talk with representatives of the Upjohn Company, Calumet and Hecla, Inc., and Miles Chemical Company concerning progress of research underway between those companies and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Dr. W. F. Krueger of the Department of Poultry Science will serve as a university representative on the National Committee on Random Sample Poultry Tests Saturday in Kansas City, Mo.

The committee establishes policies and procedures for random sample poultry tests in the United States.

Assistant professor Hugh J. Luke of the Department of English successfully completed the defense of his doctoral dissertation in June will receive the Ph.D. degree from the University of Texas.

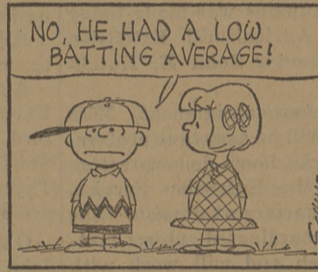
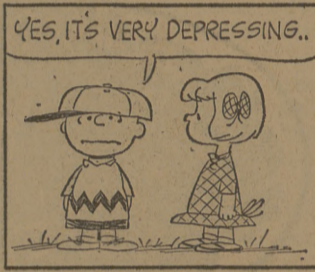
