

Palmer Still Greatest Golfer—Tony Lema Says

RYE, N.Y. (AP) — "Arnold the world-don't bury him yet." Palmer is the greatest golfer in This word of caution was passed

along Wednesday by Tony Lema, young hotshot of the professional tour, on the sport's latest guessing game: Has Jack Nicklaus overtaken Palmer as the No. 1 man in tournament golf?

"Not at all," insisted Lema, runner-up to Nicklaus in both the Masters and the Tournament of Champions at Las Vegas. "I'm getting a little fed up with this talk that Arnie is a has-been, and you've been hearing more and more of it lately.

"It just happens that Palmer is tired and in a temporary slump and Nicklaus is riding a hot streak. But Arnie will snap back—mark my words. He's still the best."

Lema, 29, a bridegroom of less than a month, was here Wednesday for a practice tour of the Westchester Country Club, site of the \$100,000 Thunderbird Classic June 13-16.

Lema said fierce determination was the quality which puts Palmer a notch above the other pro golfers.

"Nobody, not even Nicklaus, attacks a course the way Arnie does," he said.

Lema, third in the current money winning list behind Nicklaus and Gary Player, said his personal ambition is to shake the bridesmaid label.



The predominantly junior baseballers fell into a slump and ended up third behind Texas Christian and Texas.

The track team, pre-meet favorites for the SWC crown, came up with some injuries to key personnel and ended another third place finish to the Aggies' record.

The first sweeping change in the athletic department came before the school year started when Hank Foldberg replaced Jim Myers as head football coach and proceeded to move his entire staff down from Wichita to assist him.

His first season didn't turn out so good through no fault of his own as he had to fight the problems bequeathed to him by Myers.

The next big surprise, which was not really a surprise to those on the inside, was the departure of Bob Rogers as head basketball mentor. Rumors that Rogers was headed for greener pastures had been circulating before Foldberg came on the scene.

Rogers was subsequently adequately replaced by assistant Shelby Metcalf. Archie Porter, highly successful coach of Dallas Jefferson High School was hired as Metcalf's right hand man.

The last face-lifting in the athletic department was the resignation of Tommy Blake from his job as A&M sports information director. No one has been named to take his place as of the present.


In short, that's the story for Aggieland sports. For certain, more thrills, more disappointments and more changes are probably in store but only a wacky crystal ball can foresee them.
