

TAES Specialist To Retire Aug. 31

Mrs. Eloise Trigg Johnson, who helped the family life education program for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and served as a specialist in this subject matter since 1944, will retire Aug. 31. Mrs. Johnson has long been associated with educational projects designed for the enrichment of the family living program in Texas. She has worked with youth, with parents and community and civic leaders and resource people, and has assisted as coordinator of the family living program in Texas. Johnson, in commenting on the retirement of Mrs. Johnson, said that "Through her sincere, unselfish and highly effective work in the many areas centering around the family, Mrs. Johnson has given leadership to programs which have inspired and provided incentive and direction in this time of rapidly changing patterns of living. Her family life specialist has many teaching methods to which additional people with the extension program. One of her

teaching devices has been a set of visuals designed to help people understand themselves and others. Mrs. Johnson has used many approaches in presenting the family life education program, including the family approach to County Program Building and planning, regular programs and demonstrations which have served as a framework for giving assistance to interested people, personal counseling, and the encouragement and stimulation of activities or practices of interest to entire families.
