

Pet. Engineering Announces Hiring Of Prof-Researcher

Dr. Henry J. (Hank) Ramey, Jr., has been named professor of petroleum engineering and research engineer at A&M.

Ramey, a native of West Virginia, has an outstanding record in his professional field. R. L. Whiting, professor and head of the Department of Petroleum Engi-

neering, said in making the announcement.

He received his bachelor of science and doctorate in chemical engineering from Purdue University. Since then, he has worked continuously with Mobil Oil Co.

His assignments included three years with Magnolia Field Re-

search Laboratories, five years with General Petroleum Corporation and since 1960 with Mobil Oil in California. Ramey has taught part time at the University of Southern California.

Author of numerous papers, Ramey holds several patents. He was selected by the Society of Petroleum Engineers of AIME as the Cedric K. Ferguson medalist in 1959 for his paper on "Field Results of South Belridge Thermal Recovery Equipment."

A member of several professional groups, he has served as chapter president of Sigma Xi, chairman of the Society of Petroleum Engineers Transactions Editorial Committee, a member of the Raymond Award Committee and an active worker in civic affairs.
