

Business School Slates Development Course

The 12 annual Executive Development Course of the School of Business Administration has been scheduled for Jan. 26-Feb. 14. Men from the major cities of Texas are among those expected to attend.

"The primary purpose of the

course is to help the executive become more effective in his present job and to develop his abilities for advancement into positions of greater responsibility," course director W. E. Eckles said.

More than 80 state, regional or national firms have sent execu-

tives to the course during the past 11 years.

Enrollment is limited in order to provide for active participation in group study and discussions.

Faculty members and speakers come from industry, consulting firms, government and the A&M faculty.

The course puts most emphasis on production and marketing of such items as bananas, pineapples, avocados and papayas.

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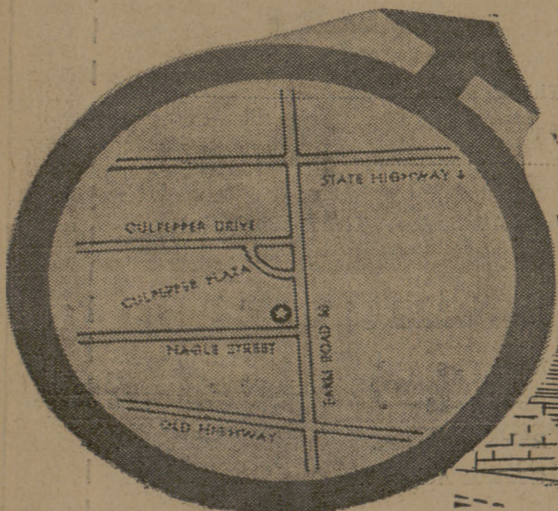
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
