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# Press Association Ends Annual Meet

The Texas Junior College Press Association concluded its annual meeting Tuesday, in the Memorial Student Center, with a lecture on the responsibility of college newspaper editors, and a business session.

College newspaper editors cannot expect freedom of the press without assuming the responsibility that goes with that freedom, said Dr. Maurice S. Shelby, a Baylor University journalism professor.

DR. SHELBY, one of the main speakers at the Texas Junior College Press Association meeting, said college editors generally have more freedom than professional news media.

He indicated that editors often confuse "censorship with advice given by the college administration.

"If editors don't exercise responsibility on their own," Dr. Shelby added, "then someone must assume that responsibility."

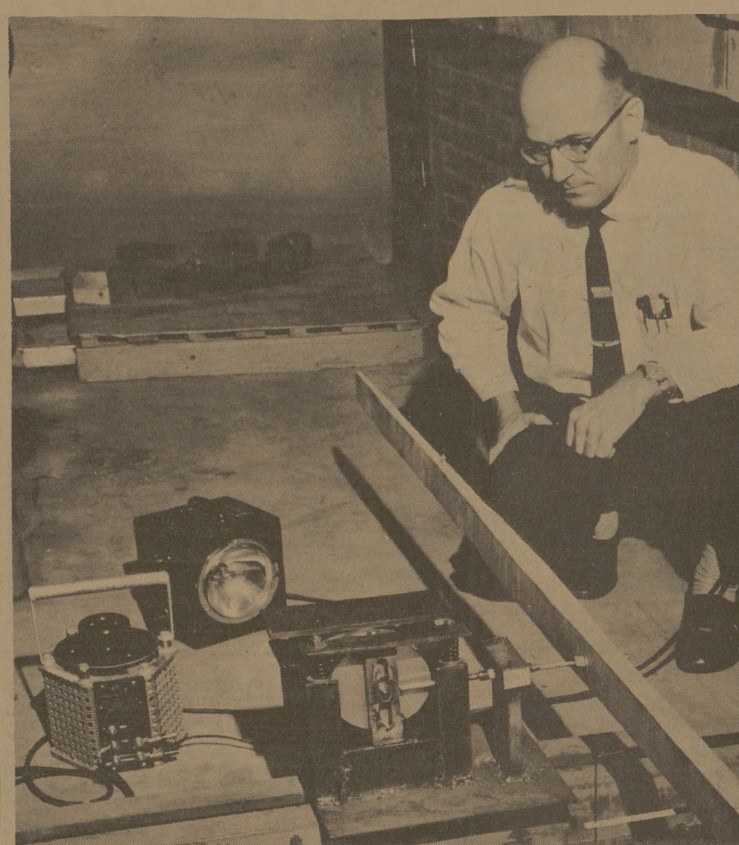

The other four recipients, all sophomores, are Aaron Hutto of Hart, pre-veterinary major; Terry Norman of Eden, math major; Roland Smith of Lawn, agronomy; and John Womack of West Columbia, business major.

Qualifications for the American Farmer Degree include at least \$1,000 from farm or ranch enterprises and demonstration of interest and leadership in FFA activities.

# English Department Head To Speak At Regional Meet

Dr. John Q. Anderson, head of the Department of English, will be the featured speaker at a regional meeting of the American Studies Association Friday and Saturday at the University of Southwest Louisiana, Lafayette. The general topic at the sessions is the humor of the Old Southwest, material written by the regional humorists who preceded Mark Twain.

The American Studies Association is an inter-disciplinary organization devoted to the study of American civilization. Professors who are members represent English, history, economics, sociology and other areas of the social sciences.

Anderson is vice president and program chairman of the American Studies Association of Texas, the regional branch for this area. The Texas group will meet in December on the A&M campus.

The meeting this week will draw members from Louisiana and Mississippi.

Anderson's speech title is "Scholarship in Southwestern Humor—Past and Present." He has published articles in the field and one book, "Louisiana Swamp Doctor."

Dr. J. R. Couch of the Department of Poultry Science will present a seminar Monday before the scientific research staff of the Animal Nutrition and Physiological Section of the American Cyanamid Co. in New Jersey.

While in the New Jersey area, Couch will confer with scientists of the Squibb Institute for Medical Research and the Hooker Chemical Co. on progress of research being conducted under an agreement between the firms and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Dr. H. E. Redmond, professor in the College of Veterinary Medicine, will speak at the Texas Livestock

Health Conference Oct. 14 in Angleton.

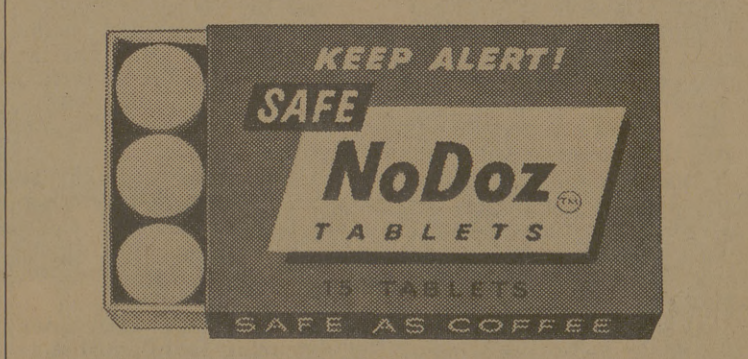
Three other members of the college will participate in the 67th U. S. Livestock Sanitary Association meeting Oct. 13-18 at Albuquerque, N. M.
