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Corps Tops Civilians, 22-14

The Corps won the second annual Twelfth Man Bowl over the civilians, 22-14, in chilly Kyle Field

Fullback Van Veselka, quarterback Ed Gibson and halfback Mike Hopkins were the outstanding players for the Corps in their second victory of the young series.

Veselka intercepted a pass, recovered a fumble and ran 70 yards through the center of the line for the second Corps score.

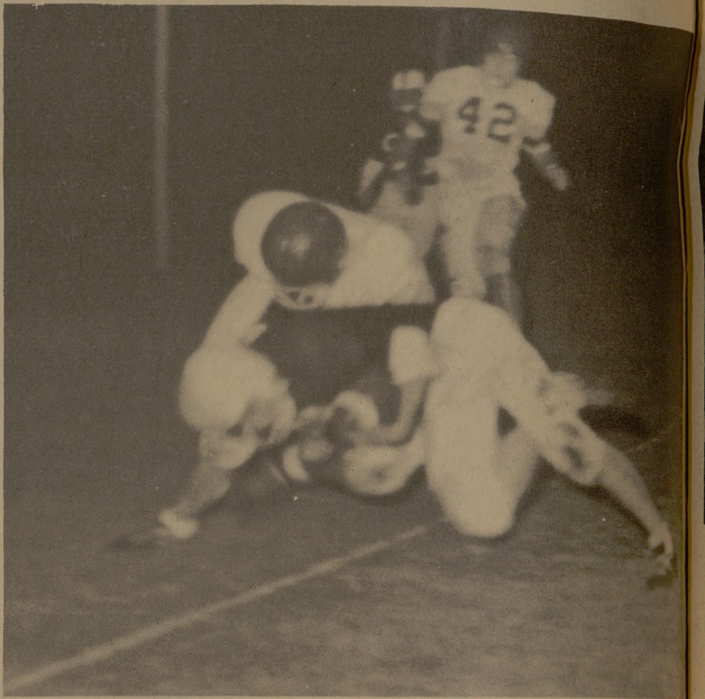
Gibson directed the Maroon attack and hit Hopkins with a touchdown pass for the Corps' second tally. Gibson also ran for one two-point conversion and passed to Bill Monier for another.

Hopkins accounted for the opening Corps touchdown with a fine 92-yard kickoff return following the civilians' first touchdown.

The civilians opened the scoring when Mike Smith weaved 42 yards for a TD with 5:50 left in the first quarter. Condy Pugh passed to Ronnie Sandford for the extra points.

The second civilian score came when halfback Bob Paulson picked up a blocked punt on the Corps 13-yard line and ran it into the end zone.

All the scoring came in the first half. The civilians had two scoring thrusts stopped in the second half, one on a pass interception.

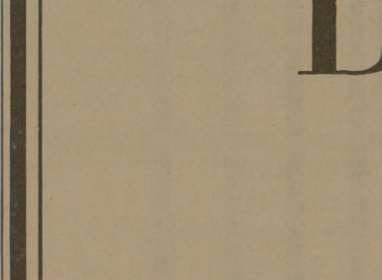

Loyola Remains Top Team, Kentucky Jumps To Second

Loyola of Chicago, rolling along unbeaten at a 100 points a game gait, remained the No. 1 college basketball team in the nation in The Associated Press poll of a panel of sports writers and sportscasters Tuesday.

The HIGH SCORING Ramblers were placed on top in 34 of the 43 ballots cast. Kentucky, which jumped from fifth to second place, received five first place votes and Michigan got three. Toledo, with a single vote, was the only other quintet to receive No. 1 consideration. The balloting was based on results through last Saturday.

Loyola, winner of its first four games, easily outdistanced the field on a point basis, scoring 417 points to Kentucky's 328. The Wildcats are 5-0. Michigan, also 5-0, jumped from seventh to third with 287 points.

CINCINNATI advanced from sixth to fourth, collecting 201 points. In its only game last week, Cincinnati beat Wisconsin 65-50 and upped its record to 3-1.

Duke, third a week ago, dropped to fifth with 171 points, and NYU fell from the runnerup spot to seventh with 133 points. Duke was knocked off the unbeaten list by Vanderbilt last week and NYU received the same treatment from Toledo.

VANDERBILT and Toledo were among the four teams that made the Top Ten for the first time. The others were UCLA and Davidson. All four are unbeaten.

UCLA vaulted into sixth place after downing Kansas 74-54 to its fourth straight.

Vanderbilt rose to eighth. Toledo landed in ninth and Davidson in 10th spot. The Vols boosted their record to 5-0 with a 62-50 overtime victory over Duke.

TOLEDO, 6-0, opened NYU's 74 in one of the biggest games of the early season. Davidson whipped previously unbeaten State for its fifth triumph.

Four teams from last week's Top Ten were knocked off the elite group. They were Arkansas State, which lost three straight last week; Ohio State, twice beaten; Oregon State and Kansas. The last two were beaten for the first time.

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
