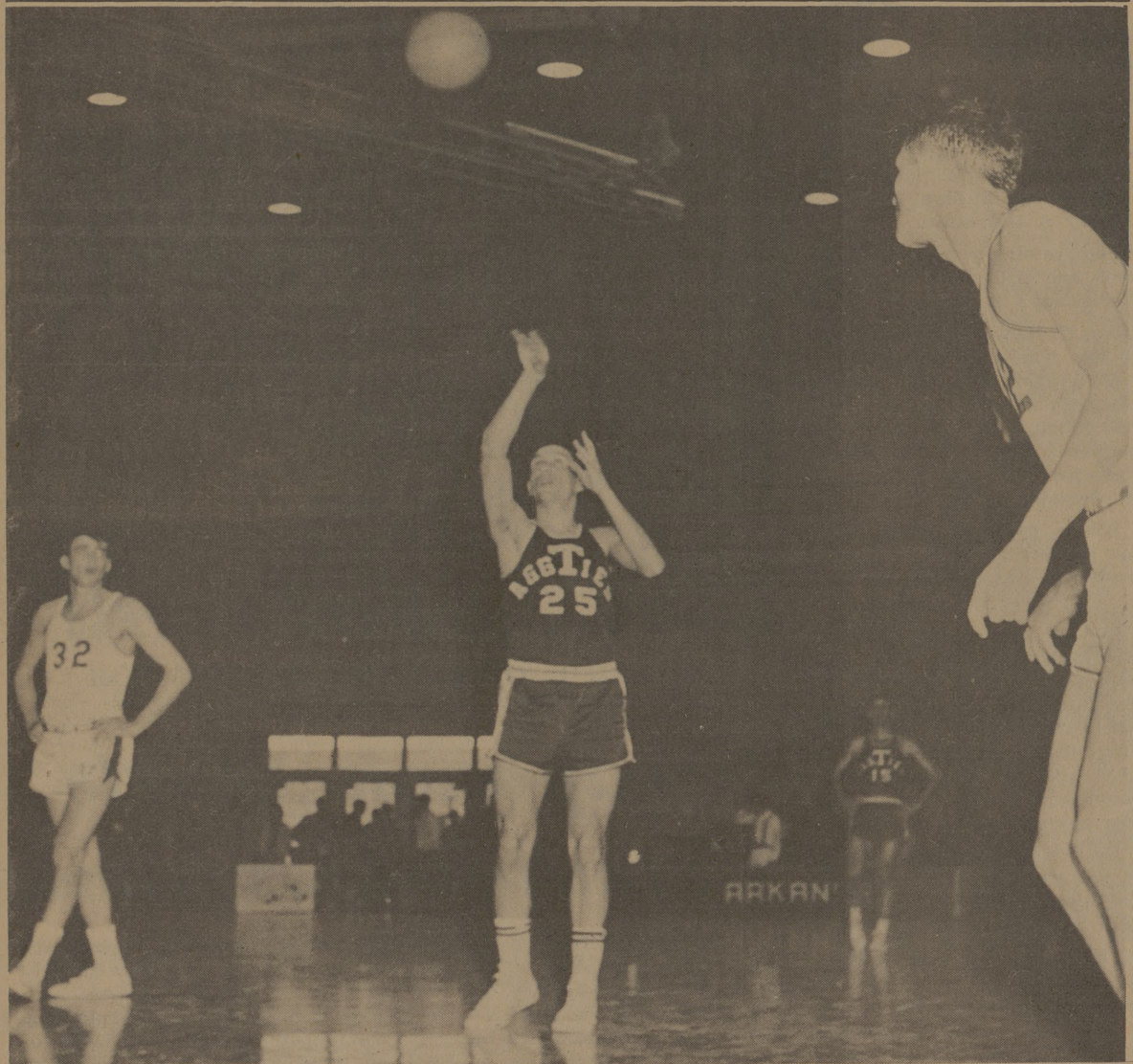


Hogs Fall To Aggies, 60-57

"It would have been easy for the team to lay down there when Arkansas had them down seven points, but the Aggies and the team's pride wouldn't let them," Metcalf added.

But the team didn't let down. Behind the long-distance bombing and free throw shooting of all-American hopeful Bennie Lenox, the Aggies made up the deficit and went on to take their third straight win, running their SWC record to 9-1 and retaining their slim one-game lead over Texas Tech.

Joe Watson of Hurst and Gary Simms of Amarillo placed fourth and fifth, respectively, in chess as individuals. The four-man team from A&M, which also included James A. Boatwright of Texas City and Stein L. Cass of Houston, placed second. No national competition in chess is planned.

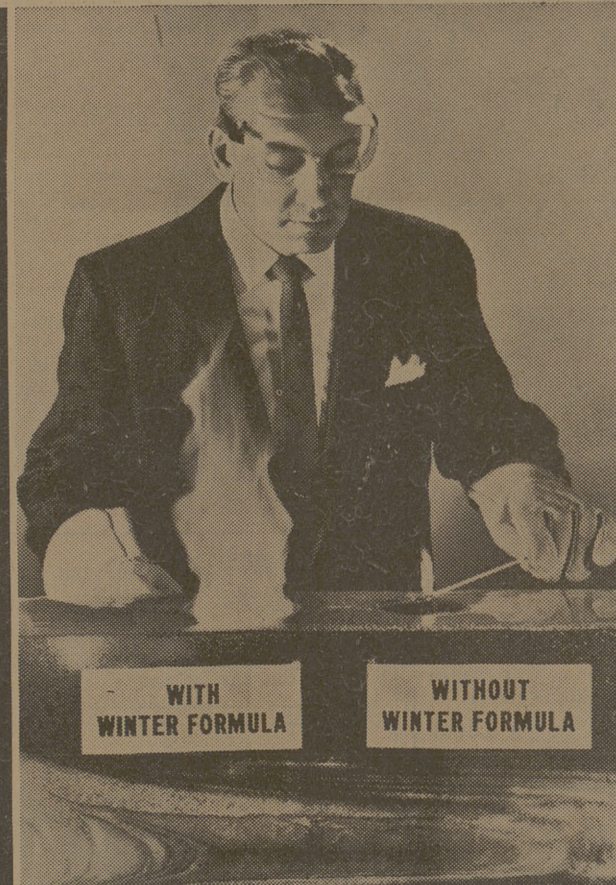

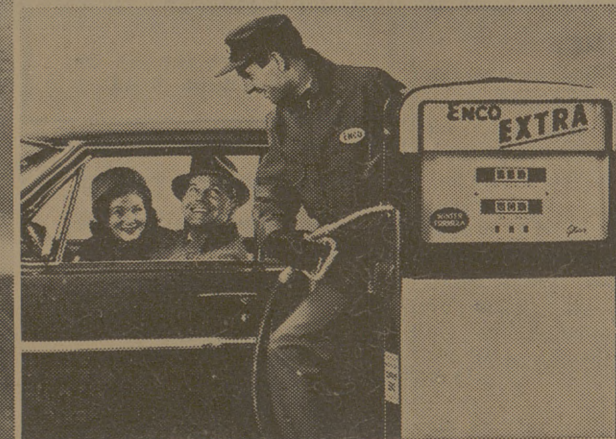
