

Sea Voyage Ends For Maritime Ags

Texas Maritime Academy cadets will sail into their home port of Galveston Saturday morning April 11 to end a successful, 10-week cruise through tropical waters and northward to Maine, Capt. Bennett M. Dodson reports. He is superintendent of the Academy which is a part of A&M University.

"The cadets are enjoying the cruise very much and found it very beneficial," Dodson said. He is "very, very pleased" with results of the cruise.

The Texas Maritime Academy is

in its second academic year and assigned its 40 cadets to the Maine Maritime Academy Training Ship State of Maine. They sailed from Galveston early in February.

Training voyages are working cruises for the future maritime officers. Deck and engine room duties, plus classes, occupy the cadets but brief shore leaves are granted at tropical ports.

The Texas cadets spent two weeks ashore while the ship was docked at the Maine Maritime Academy. The Texans visited in homes of the Maine cadets and also toured New England and Quebec.

Sophomore cadets, who last year made a training cruise to European ports, will have a 10-day leave starting Saturday, Dodson said. Then the cadets return to TMA headquarters at Galveston to resume regular college studies.

Dodson said academy freshmen will complete a six-week course at Galveston and then return to A&M for the summer term.

Maritime academy cadets spend their freshman year at A&M and then complete college studies at the academy.

Marketing Majors Enter Competition

Knowledge acquired in several years of college study is being put to use by six marketing majors representing A&M University in the Marketing Competition Conference at Michigan State University.

The conference centers around the MSU Management Game which simulates the operations of a multi-firm, one-product industry. Its purpose is to help managers and students of management to learn more about the work of top-level planning and policy formulation in business.

Colleges and universities from all over the nation are pitted against each other in the decision-making game simulating business situations concerning pricing, advertising, production units and plant expansion and maintenance.

Five regular team members and one alternate, all chosen from the marketing society will participate. They are Jim Buchanan, president, Chris Schaezler, Ken Scott, Norman Meyer, Tom Disinger and T. C. Kolkhorst, the alternate member. Robert T. Ames, Instructor in Business Administration, and Herbert G. Thompson, Associate Professor of Business Administration, sponsor the Marketing Society. Ames will accompany the team to Michigan.

Prior to convening at conference headquarters, each participating school will have considered four management problems of a substantial firm in a hypothetical manufacturing industry.

The A&M team will be the only Texas representative at the conference, said Ames.

Graphics Contest Set For Saturday

The A&M University Engineering Graphics Department will hold its 24th annual local graphics contest April 11 for undergraduate students.

Samuel M. Cleland, professor of engineering graphics and contest chairman, said competition will cover four classes of graphical problems: A working drawing, descriptive geometry problems, freehand lettering, and freehand drawing.

"Any undergraduate student currently enrolled in an engineering graphics course and who has not participated in a previous drawing contest at A&M is eligible to compete," Cleland pointed out.

Education Heads Will Attend Meet

Executive Secretary Forrest E. Conner of the American Association of School Administrators will speak June 9 to a general assembly of Texas schoolmen at A&M.

Dr. Conner will discuss "Hot Spots on the Administrators Chair," Dr. Paul Hensarling, head of the A&M Department of Education and Psychology and conference general chairman, said.

Meeting on the A&M campus June 8-10 will be the Texas Association of County Superintendents, Texas School Administrators Association and Texas Association of Instructional Supervisors.

CONNER WILL be introduced by Austin School Supt. Irby Caruth, immediate past president of the American Association of School Administrators.

Conner also is scheduled to speak to a sectional meeting of Texas school superintendents here.

The veteran schoolman served in 1960-61 as president of the American Association of School Administrators and last November became executive secretary of

the association in Washington, D. C.

HE SERVED AS superintendent of the St. Paul, Minn., schools before going to Washington. Earlier, he was superintendent at Kenosha, Wis. He also has filled school posts in South Dakota and Iowa.

Conner was born in Wisconsin and grew up in South Dakota, attending the University of South Dakota where he received the B.A. degree in 1923. He completed the M.A. degree in 1935 and two years later received the Ph.D. from the State University of Iowa.

Conner has served as a delegate to international conferences and received various honors including the William G. Anderson Award of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

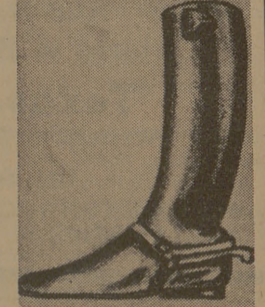
