

Visiting German Professor Prepares To End Stay Here

Herbert Ohl returns to Germany this weekend after a six-week stay at A&M University as a visiting professor in the School of Architecture.

The German professor, however, leaves behind enough homework to keep Aggies busy. In fact, some of the questions he raised on urban planning and development will take

years to solve. The 37-year-old architect worked primarily with fifth-year architecture majors in their attempt to solve perplexing urban center issues.

Ohl, for instance, got the students interested in urban area transportation, both automobile and pedestrian, and asked them to offer solutions for this ever-increasing traffic jam.

AS A GROUP, the students are now putting finishing touches on a model metropolitan center. One of its features is a method of stacking streets to allow smoother, faster traffic flow as well as provide more parking facilities.

The ground-level street, for example, might handle high-speed traffic passing through the downtown area.

Students To Sample Brazos Politics

Three statistics students at A&M will sample political feelings in Brazos County this weekend. The three, Donald Anderson, Ronald Sperberg and Charles Shook, will interview 100 persons to construct a representative sample to predict outcome of the upcoming state and national elections.

Anderson, spokesman of the group, emphasized that the project was a graduate class assignment and was not affiliated with any party or candidate. The trio of researchers also will attempt to determine if Brazos County might be considered a "model" county in that its choice of state and national candidates would accurately reflect regional or state preference.

Missouri Students Riot Over Food

MARYVILLE, Mo. (AP) — State highway patrolmen moved into Maryville in force Wednesday to prevent further student rioting at Northwest Missouri State College.

For two consecutive nights more than 1,000 students have held noisy, stone-throwing demonstrations in the downtown area over what they claim is the poor quality of food served by the college.

Forty to 50 highway patrolmen joined law enforcement officers from more than 100 miles away in patrolling the town.

Gov. John M. Dalton ordered the patrol into Maryville after the president of the college asked for help to "secure the installation."

Mrs. J. T. Sheldon, head dietitian at the college since 1957, resigned "in view of existing circumstances" and asked that she be relieved immediately.

Students who take most of their meals at the cafeteria named committees of 15 men and 15 women for a meeting scheduled by J. W. Jones, president of the 2,900-student institution.

City officials announced they were ready to summon re-enforcements from among Missouri and Iowa officers should the students stage disturbances off the campus like they did Monday and Tuesday nights.

The demonstrations began week ago when about 800 students marched to Mrs. Sheldon's home in a peaceful protest. College officials led them back to the campus.

Monday night they marched to the downtown area and blocked U. S. 71, causing a traffic jam more than three miles long. Tuesday night about 1,000 students rioted in the downtown area. Officers dispersed them with tear gas, fire hoses, and police dogs.

Four students were arrested and charged with disorderly conduct.

City Manager Glen Boyles said as long as the students stay peaceful, the city will not interfere unless help is asked by college officials.

A food expert, Ernest Smith, Columbia, Mo., made a week study last fall of the meals at the cafeteria and only recommended that the place experiment with a greater variety of meals.

This possibility was raised by Joe A. Airola, assistant superintendent for instruction in the Spring Branch Schools of Houston.

Grammar Schools May End Grades Says Supervisor

Airola, president of the Texas Association of Instructional Supervisors, said the "continuing progress plan," as it is called, Spring Branch, represents a change in teaching materials.

The program divides the first three years of reading and arithmetic into 12-week steps. A child advances from step to step as he individually masters the subject.

"We don't expect children to grow physically at the same rate," Airola pointed out. "And a child does not progress at the same rate in all subjects."

Children, parents and teachers were pleased with the program introduced this year at one Spring Branch elementary school. Airola noted. It will be expanded in September to include half of the elementary schools there.

Corpus Christi has one elementary school using "steps" and Pasadena Schools are developing similar program, he pointed out.

Other Texas schools have plans under study, Airola said.

Grades were described as "arbitrary" and made necessary the turn of the century as measurements rose.

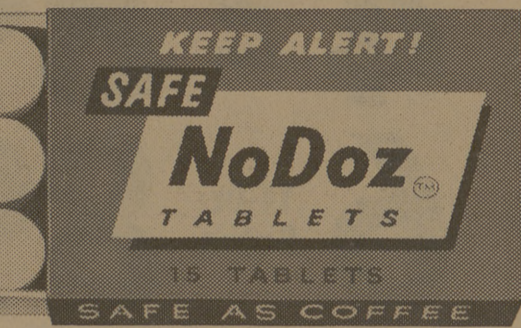
