

Texas Open Meet Favorite

SAN ANTONIO (AP)—The \$40,000 Texas Open, oldest tournament on golf's winter tour begins Thursday and the favorite is a mystery man.

The biggest names—Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player and Julius Boros—are missing and the fact that nobody has been able to win more than one tournament all year makes it a free-for-all. The tournament is being dedi-

cated to Jimmy Demaret, who has played in it more times than anybody and four times was runner-up. He might be as much the favorite as anybody.

There will be more than 150 hacking at par 35-35-70 over the tight 6,715-yard Oak Hills Country Club course, among whom are 12 of the top money-winners and five players who have won tournaments this year.

Also, there will be six former champions headed by Phil Rodgers, who won it last year with a 16-under-par 268 for 72 holes. Others who have dragged down first money and are back trying for more are E. J. "Dutch" Harrison, twice champion; Chandler Harper, Gene Littler, Jay Hebert and Jack Burke Jr.

Regalia For The May Commencement

All students who are candidates for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy are required to order hoods as well as the doctor's cap and gown. The hoods are to be left at the Registrar's Office no later than 1:00 p. m., Tuesday, May 19 (this will be accomplished by a representative of the College Exchange Store). The Ph. D. hoods will not be worn in the procession since all such candidates will be hooded on the stage as a part of the ceremonies. Candidates for the Master's Degree will wear the Master's cap and gown. All civilian students who are candidates for the Bachelor's Degree will wear the Bachelor's cap and gown. ROTC students who are candidates for the Bachelor's Degree will wear the Class "A" cadet uniform in lieu of academic regalia. Senior hoods are optional with the uniform. Rental of caps and gowns may be arranged with the Exchange Store. Orders may be placed between 8:00 a. m. Monday, May 4 and 12:00 noon Saturday, May 16. The rental is as follows: Doctor's cap and gown \$5.25, Master's cap and gown \$4.75, Bachelor's cap and gown \$4.25. Hood rental is the same as that for cap and gown. A 2% Texas State Sales Tax is required in addition to these rentals. 3315

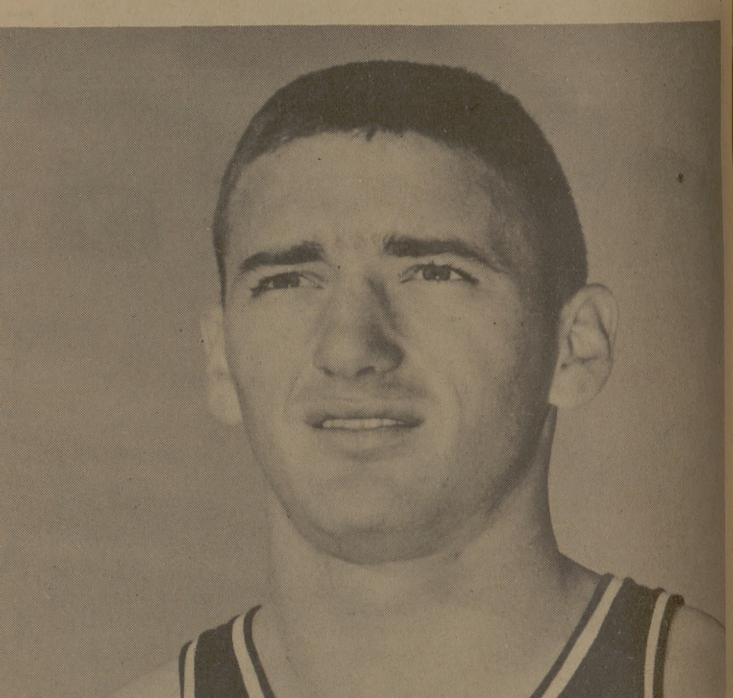
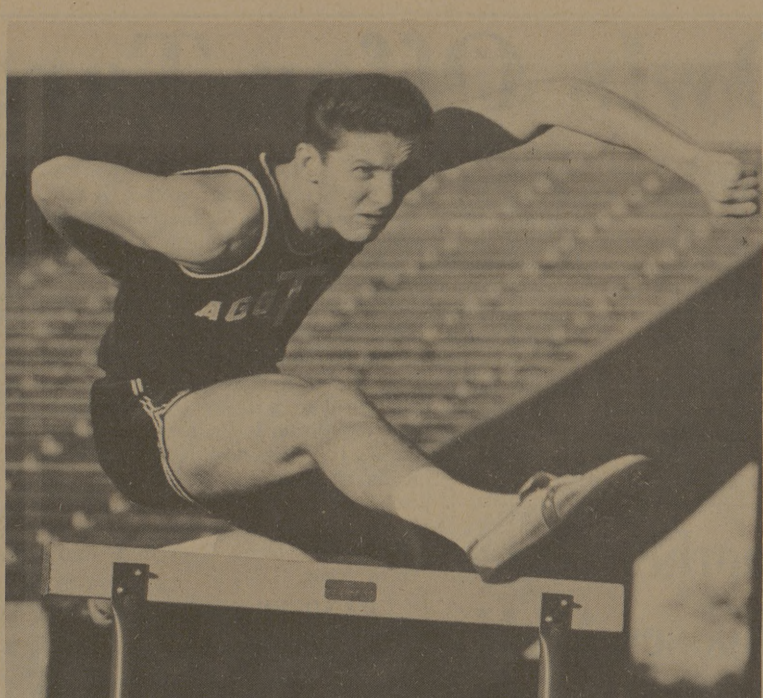

Thinclads Run In Two Meets

Maroon thinclads will be running far and wide this weekend with a five-man squad competing in the Drake Relays at Des Moines, Iowa, while the remainder of the team goes to Waco Saturday for a seven-way encounter at Baylor.

Flying to the Corn State with Coach Charlie Thomas will be Danny Roberts, John Collins, Bob Brown, David Glover and Randy Matson.

Roberts will be going after another double win in the shot put and discus, a precedent he set last week in the Kansas Relays. Matson, A&M's freshman weight phenom, will enter the shot in a special open event.

Collins will enter three events—high jump, broad jump and high hurdles—while Brown will also go in the broad jump. Glover will compete in the discus.
