The A&M campus mail service has delivered millions of pieces of mail, but back in 1919 there was a slipup, workmen descovered Wednesday.


A bill from Magnolia Petroleum Co., addressed in now-fading ink to Professor E. J. Fermier, was found as workmen moved the Faculty Exchange mail boxes to a new site. Professor Fermier came here in 1906 as professor and head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering and at the time of his death in 1927 also served as vice dean of engineering.

The envelope was postmarked Houston, June 4, 1919, Wallace Dean Beal, campus mail service director, said.

Beal said disposal of the letter will follow postal regulations.
