

Aggies Get A Letter A Day' Says Postmaster (Horselaff!)

In the average every Aggie mail has a College Station box gets one letter a day, said Greg, postmaster of the College Station Post Office.

Students send about 2,500 pieces mail a day and about 20,000 pieces in the campus in one day. On weekdays this drops to about 6,000 pieces. On Sundays the out going drops to about 3,000 pieces.

In the last four weeks 527,067 pieces of mail have been sent from College Station Post Office, Greg said.

Of this total 239,354 were letter pieces; 114,225 penalty mail; 841 magazines, papers and flats; registered pieces; 13,981 fourth class; 54,681 third class; and 808 second class.

Christmas Seals In Mail For Tuberculosis Campaign

The Brazos County Tuberculosis Association got its annual Christmas Seal Campaign rolling Monday with the mailing of 13,400 appeal letters. According to Mrs. Otis Miller, executive director of the campaign, some 6,300 of these letters will go to A&M students.

Latest tabulation shows 65 active cases of TB in Brazos County with five of these reported in the last three weeks.

These victims will be aided by part of the 81 cents out of every dollar received in the campaign to be sent back to the Brazos County Association, Mrs. Miller said.

Campaign goal for 1964, she said, is \$7,000.

"OFF CAMPUS AND SPECIAL ACTIVITIES"

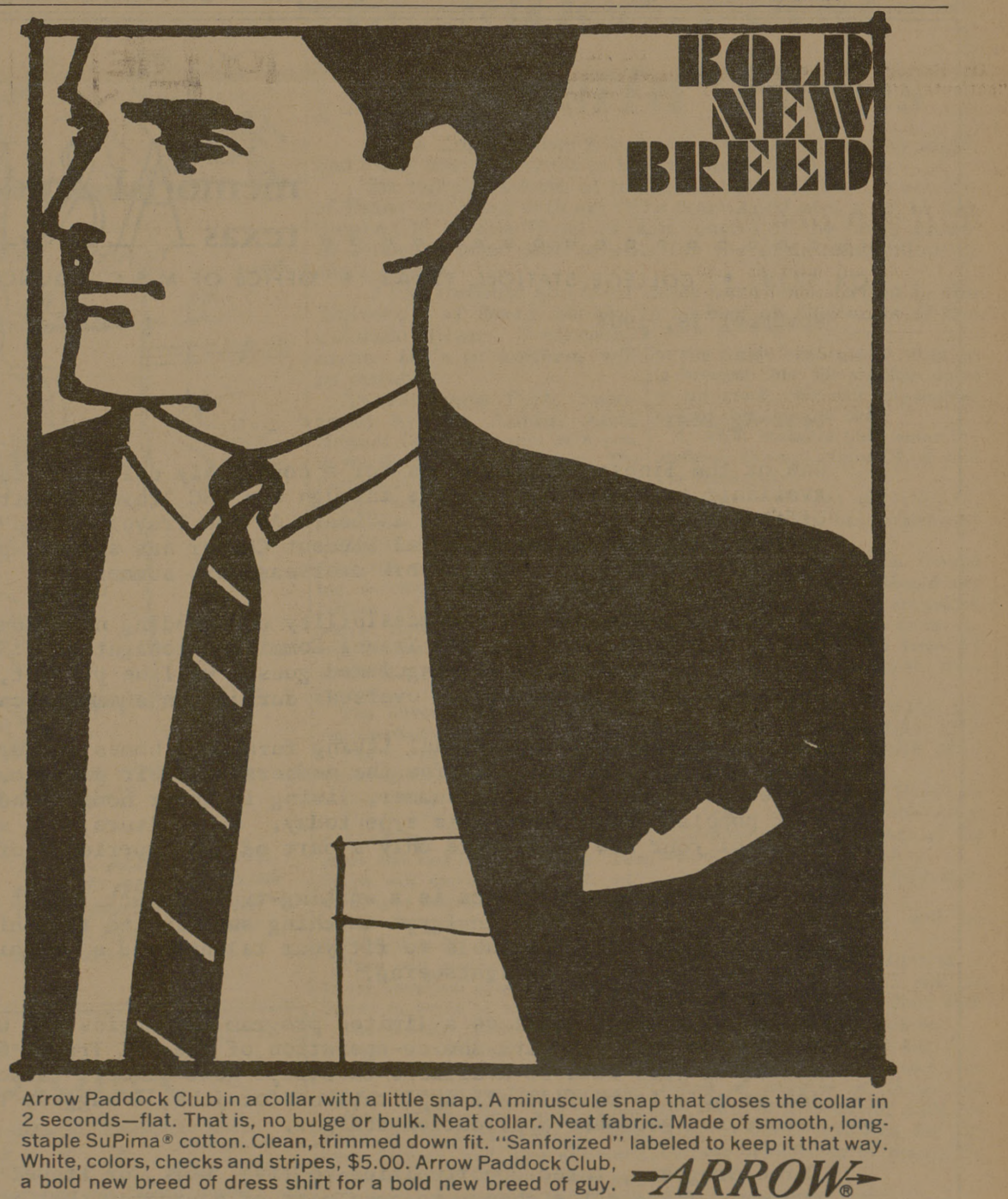
