Robert E. Magowan is here as a doctoral student in industrial education. He hopes to complete the Doctor of Education degree, the recognized professional degree for his field, in 1967.

As a high school senior Magowan built a 15-inch model schooner to win top honors nationally in a contest sponsored by Ford Motor Co. The model sailing vessel built of individual strips of mahogany for the planking and completed in ultimate detail now is back home with Magowan's parents in Miami, Fla. "I'm worked to death, but I'm
